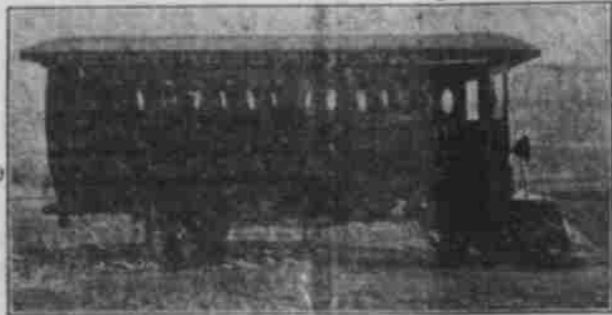

Notice of Street Improvement

Pursuant to the order of the Common Council contained in Ordinance No. 635 of the city of Hood River, Oregon, passed by the Common Council August 21, 1922, and approved by the Mayor August 22, 1922, notice is hereby given that the undersigned City Recorder will receive bids for the following named streets:

Sixth Street—By constructing and laying down a cement sidewalk and a cement curb gutter on the west side of Sixth Street from Sherman Avenue north to present cement sidewalk.

Tenth Street—The west side of 10th Street from Cascade Avenue north 100 feet by constructing and laying down a cement sidewalk.

Eighth Street—The east side of 8th Street from Cascade Avenue north to walk area and by constructing and laying down a cement sidewalk.

May Street—North side, from 7th street west to present cement sidewalk by constructing and laying down a cement sidewalk.

North side from 9th Street east to the present cement sidewalk by laying down and constructing cement sidewalk.

May street—South side from 9th Street east to present cement sidewalk by constructing and laying down a cement sidewalk.

South side from 10th Street west about 100 feet to present cement sidewalk by constructing and laying down a cement sidewalk.

South side from 11th Street west to present cement sidewalk by constructing and laying down a cement sidewalk.

Twelfth Street—East side of 12th Street north from May Street to the existing cement sidewalk by constructing and laying down a cement sidewalk.

Eugene Street—The south side of Eugene Street from 9th Street west to present cement sidewalk by constructing and laying down cement sidewalks.

Sherman Avenue—South side from 6th Street east to the east line of Lot "H" by constructing and laying down a cement sidewalk.

The grading of the sidewalk area, or the area from the property line to the curb line shall be done where needed in making any of said improvements to or upon said streets or avenues or parts thereof.

Drains and means of conveying water shall be constructed in said streets, or parts thereof, where needed.

Sealed proposals for the work will be received at my office up to 8 o'clock p. m., September 5, 1922, and the Common Council will at its next regular meeting after the completion of the publication of this notice, to-wit:

On the 5th day of September, 1922, at the Council Chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. proceed to open and consider all bids for said work, which is ordered by the Common Council by said Ordinance No. 635, duly enacted as above specified; that the improvement will be let in one contract, and will be required to be completed within thirty (30) days from the date of the awarding the same to the successful bidder who will be required to furnish a bond to the City of Hood River in the sum of not less than 25 per cent of the estimated cost of the contract for the faithful performance thereof; that complete specifications are on file in my office covering the improvements for which bids are called, which may be examined by prospective bidders upon application, and said contract will be awarded to the lowest and best bidder upon said specifications.

The City reserves the right to reject any or all bids, or to waive any defects therein, for the benefit of the City of Hood River. The terms of the specifications shall be notice to prospective bidders of the requirements demanded by said City in the performance of said work.

EARLY HIGH PRICE HURTFUL TO GROWER

H. F. Davidson, president of the recently organized Fruit Export Corporation, a concern effected by himself and Yakima and Wenatchee apple men, declared while here last week that Northwestern apple growers are reaping some of the ill effects of starting the opening price on apples annually too high.

"This year," said Mr. Davidson, "while a number of price lists have been announced, all of them from 25 to 75 cents per box lower than last year, no apple sales of any consequence have been made. There has been less buying this season than since 1912. For the past seven or eight years growers have hurt themselves by starting apples into consumption at prices that are too high. Buyers of early apples have lost money with the result that the general purchasing and movement of fruit into consumption has been retarded. When apples sell on the pier in New York City at \$4.25 and \$4.50 per box, the retailers establish their price on this basis. But they never reduce their price in case the wholesale price drops. Thus they make heavier profits and the producer is the one to lose."

"The public, too, will not buy of a product when it is thought abnormally high, and apple growers, if they would encourage a greater consumption of their product, would ultimately be the winners. They should reverse the situation of the retailer who would have to continue selling his product to the consumer on the price established from the low wholesale price."

Mr. Davidson says his export concern contemplates shipping from 400 to 500 carloads of apples to Europe the coming season. J. McPherson Ferguson, of Yakima, who has been touring the principal European markets since June 15, was expected to arrive in Seattle Friday night, where Mr. Davidson contemplated meeting him, plans for action in the near future depending on the report of Mr. Ferguson.

Mr. Davidson says he finds an excellent fruit crop in all parts of the Northwest. He has just returned from Medford, where he says the harvest of pears is phenomenal. That district, he says, will ship 1,200 cars of pears, twice as many as in any former season.
