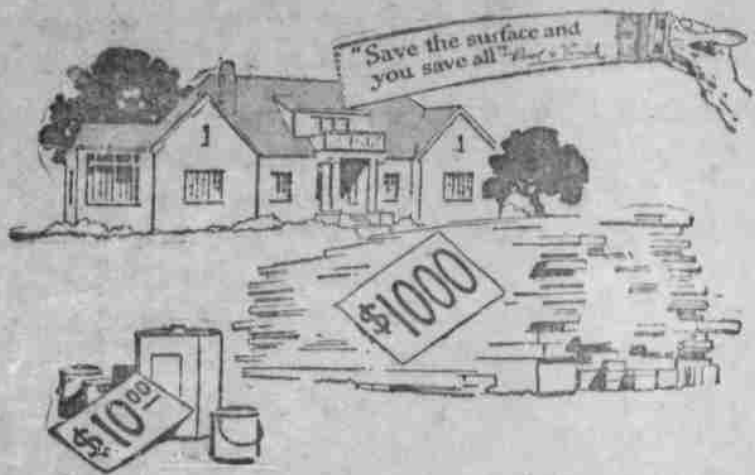

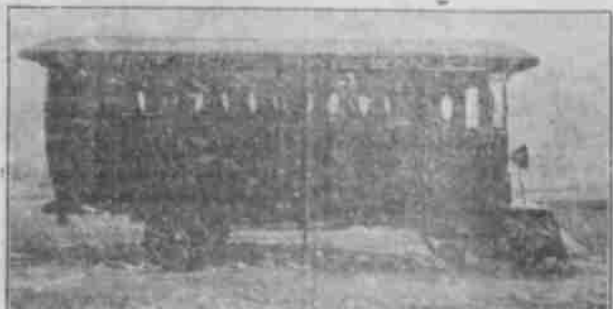

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APPLE HARVEST IS GETTING UNDER WAY

The valley apple harvest will get in fairly good swing by the latter part of this week. Growers are already picking Winter Bananas in a number of sections. Jonathans are mature, but sufficient frost for giving the variety its characteristic coloring has not prevailed.

The past week of warm weather, while ideal for late corn and certain vegetable crops, is not to the liking of orchardists. Growers would prefer colder nights. Light frost is needed to give color to the fruit. With plenty of water available, however, the apples are taking on an increased size as result of the continued growing days, and indications point to a crop approaching 3,000 carloads, including cooking and cull grades shipped, heavier than last year by more than 150 cars.

The chief worry of valley orchardists at the present time is the shortage of boxes. With the fruit sizing and bringing the yield in excess of early estimates, nearly all orchardists are caught in need of boxes. Growers are constantly beseeching shipping concerns for a further supply of containers.

The Apple Growers Association last week completed packing its tonnage of this week. An approximate 20 carloads. The yield is 10 cars heavier than last season. The concern has sold 25 cars of the fruit, and shipments are being made daily. Eight cars of Bartlett and two of Flemish Beauties have already rolled.

J. A. McCarrick, representative of Hezekiah Warner & Sons, New York city apple merchants, after a tour of Wenatchee and Yakima districts, was here last week calling on shippers. Mr. McCarrick says he finds that practically no sales of apples have been made in any of the Northwestern districts.

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HARVEST WAGES SET BY GROWERS

Apple growers at a mass meeting last week set a wage scale for the apple harvest. Prices for various harvest tasks have been announced as follows:

Picking—4 to 5 cents per box, depending on efficiency, orchard conditions and permanency of workers. Packing—4 to 5 cents per box; sorters, \$2.50 to \$3 per day; day wages for men, 30 to 35 cents per hour; day wages for women, 25 to 30 cents per hour.

The free employment office just opened by the Association is being visited by numerous transient harvest hands, already arriving, and indications point to a plentiful supply of pickers and general harvest help. A shortage of packers may result before the season is over, however.

KOBERG HAS MADE BEACH IMPROVEMENTS

John H. Koberg, who recently opened to the public a Columbia river bathing beach just east of the city, declares that the recreational place has grown so in popularity that he has had to equip it for evening parties. The beach is now lighted with electric lights, and Mr. Koberg provides music from a phonograph. The instrument is placed high on the side of Stanley Rock, landmark for mid-Columbia mariners on the Koberg place, and its sound carries across the river to Bingen, Wash. Residents there report that they can hear the concerts distinctly.

The bathing beach has developed beyond expectations this year, and Mr. Koberg plans on making such improvements before next season that it will be an attraction for local summer resorts.

Strawberry Weevil Quarantine (Ferreira M. Green)

I wish to call the attention of strawberry growers, who may be intending to sell plants the coming season, to the strawberry weevil quarantine established by the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, to the effect that any person, firm or corporation, growing strawberry plants for sale for propagation purposes, shall apply for inspection of the fields not less than six weeks previous to the time planned for removal of the plants intended for sale. It also provides that all fields found infested or in or adjacent to an area likely to be infested by the strawberry root weevil, which in the judgment of the inspector is or is likely to be a source of contamination through the disposal of plants for propagation purposes, shall be quarantined, and no plants may be used for sale or propagation from said quarantined fields.

Certificates of inspection are to be issued for all plants from fields free from the weevil.

Squash Boosts 1925 Fair

Leon Le Franque is doing his bit to boost the 1925 Portland Fair. Mr. Le Franque is an adept at stenciling young squashes and pumpkins by a process that leaves in clear imprint any lettering he wishes them to display when mature. He placed, in remarkably decorative fashion, the numerals 1, 9, 2 and 5 on a large yellow banana squash last summer. Today the squash has grown into the hugest specimen ever seen here, and the inscription is very plain.

The large squash, with its "1925" in plain view, has been displayed in the show window of E. A. Franz Co., where it is attracting considerable attention. It will be sent to the Portland fair boosters. The squash, 37 inches in length, weighs 47 pounds.

Osborn Pays Fine

Tamp Osborn, arrested Saturday night, September 9, on a charge of larceny, was fined \$25 and costs Thursday by Judge Othank. Osborn when first arraigned pleaded not guilty and called for a jury trial. His case had been set for Friday. He changed his plea to guilty Thursday.
