Snow Raises 126-inch Sunflower

Gardeners and ranchers last week brought so many championship specimens to the First National Bank that the foyer of the financial institution looked like a corner of a county fair.

Berkeley Snow, manager of the local branch of the Pacific Power & Light Co., who resides on a West Side ranch, exhibited a sunflower stalk 10 feet and six inches high on which were 40 large blossoms. It was declared by all who saw it to be the largest sunflower ever grown in the Hood River valley.

E. E. Lage, Pine Grove rancher, displayed a sheaf of wheat from a field that produced at the rate of 45 bushels to the acre. He also showed corn of a yellow dent variety, many stalks of which carry two large ears. The corn was grown without irrigation.

Imbler Orchardist Visits Here

William Miller, of Imbler, where he owns one of the largest orchards of eastern Oregon, left for home Tuesday night after spending several days here inspecting Hood River orchards and learning methods of pack, grading and sales of fruit. Mr. Miller says that the Imbler district is fast developing into an apple district of no mean proportions. Estimates place the crop there this year at about 250 carloads.

Mr. Miller expects to harvest 25,000 boxes on his own place. The chief varieties of the Imbler district are Rome Beauty, Grimes Golden, Delicious, Wagner.

H. M. Swain, formerly in charge of the orchards of the East Hood River Fruit Co. at Mosier, is now superintending Mr. Miller's orchard.
