### ASSOCIATION TO AID APPLE WEEK

The Apple Growers Association expresses a keen interest in the apple week, proposed by the Portland Chamber of Commerce as a measure for getting into circulation the heavy stocks of storage apples remaining here and in Portland. "We welcome most heartily the plans proposed by the Portland Chamber for stimulating the sale of apples," said P. F. Clark, sales manager of the Association. "Never have the people of Portland had such an opportunity to feast on fine apples as such an extremely moderate price. We have never had a greater number of apples to offer at this season of the year. With the price to the consumer now down lower than growers are usually asking at their orchards, there is no reason why every Portland family should not have apples by the box in their homes. We will cooperate in every way with the Portland chamber in making the Apple Week plans a success."

#### Lindley Spight is Manager

Lindley H. Spight, representative of the Hood River Chamber of Commerce at Oregon Agricultural College, will have charge of publicity for Hood River at the first business show to be given by the School of Commerce, March 30 and 31.

An extensive publicity campaign is being carried out by the advertising committee in order that as many business men and high school students as possible may attend. Many things of interest to the modern business world will be operated for the interested. The show is not an advertisement for any company and absolutely nothing will be sold, according to those in charge.

The college representatives throughout the state have signified their willingness to have booths and exhibits and give illustrated lectures of their home communities. The various committees are working hard to make their first show a great success, and expect a large attendance, says the chairman of the advertising committee.

#### Apple Movement Slow

The movement of apples from here the past week has been very slow. The Apple Growers Association, which holds practically all of the fruit left, a total of 226,733 boxes, shipped 24,867 boxes for the week ending Friday night. The Association continues to receive apples from its members. During the past week a total of 1,220 boxes were delivered from up-valley points, bringing the total for the season to 1,306,968 boxes.

### APPLE GROWERS WANT MORE EFFECTIVE SPRAYING

Disinfection to protect fruit from the blight which often get a large percentage of the crop into the unprofitable grades is more than ever apparent in the valley this year according to the Apple Growers Association. "During the winter the reports of low prices for fruit had the effect of making the average grower extremely conservative," said E. E. Bennett. "This feeling has been rather marked, but at the present time we notice that the more thoughtful and progressive ones are making plans for the future which provide for the production of the largest possible average of high grade fruit. It seems to be pretty generally accepted that the fruit business over an average of five years is going to be profitable in direct proportion to the thoroughness with which modern methods of care and protection against pests are employed. "Even the casual observer understands that the fight against these pests is becoming more intensive every season, for if they once get a foothold it is a bitter struggle to get rid of them."

"With these facts so deeply impressed upon their minds by experiences of the past two or three seasons, the independent sprayer equipment is now being used by more and more growers. We have already sold more Hardie sprayers than we had a year ago at this time. "Demanding the demand for more effective, more trouble-proof and longer-lasting spraying equipment, the Hardie company has perfected more improvements during the past two seasons than in any corresponding period of the past. This is particularly true in their designing of a hooded, dust-proof machine. Therefore I would ask the cooperation of all legionnaires in the above matter.

#### Wind River Co. Files Mortgage

Hood River county folk have noted with interest the filing of a mortgage at the Register's Office by the Wind River Lumber Co., for \$328,074.02. It is thought that the mortgage may indicate a resumption of work of the company's large sawmill at Cascade Locks, a plant which has been idle for two years. The lumber concern owns large timber holdings on the headwaters of Wind River in Shastana county, Washington. The logs are floated down the stream and brought across to Cascade Locks by rafts.

MacMillan, aged 46, who is survived by his wife and eight children. Funeral services in charge of the Masonic lodge of Natchez occurred Friday, January 26.

Mr. MacMillan is also survived by his father, Dr. Wesley MacMillan, a physician aged 81 years, who has been in active practice at Natchez Harbor, N. S., for more than 60 years.

### THE THIRD ALARM

During a storming attack on the bank, depicting a story of heroism and valor, the "Third Alarm" will be shown at the State Theatre February 25, 26 and 27 in connection with "Omen Up Week."

Conceived and created by Henry Johnson, who was responsible for the great police melodrama, "The Third Alarm" is a story of the life of an American life of today. It reveals for once what the fireman—the every-day, hard-working, devoted servant who risks his life in the performance of his daily duties, means to our civilization. It dramatizes the lives of the very men who protect us and the property of the taxpayers of this country. It shows their struggle, the hazards they confront, the perils they undergo and their devotion to duty that we may live in peace and contentment.

The show has to do with the experiences of a veteran fire-fighter named Dan McDowell. Dan was a famous hero in the ranks of the smoke-eaters. But his years of loyal service dimmed his eyes and weakened the iron grip that held the reins of the plunging horses and he was cast into the discard. The old white horse, "Bullies" by name, also went the way of his master when the horse-drawn vehicles of the department were replaced by motors. McDowell became a ditch digger. "Bullies" was employed in work no less arduous.

The troubles of adversity heaped upon old McDowell but he kept a stiff upper lip and triumphed in the end. His rescue of his son, Johnnie, also a fire-fighter, and June Rutherford, the daughter of a famous surgeon, when the young couple were trapped in a burning building is beyond question one of the most thrilling episodes ever created for the screen.

#### Portland Auto Show On

From the shows at Chicago and New York the focal point of the American automobile industry swings to the great district shows, one of the most important of which is the Portland show, being held this week. Portland's exhibition is the Northwest center of the trade and the motor fans for Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana. From Portland the interest swings to San Francisco where the show opens February 17, running for one week.

Neither the Portland show nor the San Francisco show were timed this year until after the big shows in the east had been seen, so as to make certain that the very latest in everything would have ample time to get to Portland, as well as the leaders of the industry who head towards the west at about the same time as the exhibitors.

While primarily a retail show, its importance as the exhibit of the Northwest trade has grown year by year. The Portland auditorium space devoted to the show this year covers three floors of the block square building. Never in the history of shows has the demand for space been what it was this year. Every foot from the basement to the top is filled with automobiles or some device that makes owning a motor the more enjoyable or the more practical, or economical.
