SHEEP MANURE IS FAVORED BY GROWERS

Fertilized sheep manure is becoming a popular fertilizer among Hood River growers. The Hood River Growers' Association, which will later have a radio club, has secured from the Hood River sheep raisers a quantity of sheep manure for analysis. The analysis of the Lyle manure is as follows: Nitrogen, 2.87 per cent; ammonia, 2.88 per cent; phosphoric acid, 1.83 per cent; calcium phosphate, 2.32 per cent; potash, 3.08. This is said to be more than twice as strong as the ordinary prepared sheep manure.

The Portland park board recently ordered two cars of the Kilkenny county sheep manure for use on lawns in the Rose City. The Eden brand product, as the Washington product is known to the trade, is being handled locally by Duckwall Bros., who are finding a keen demand for it.

J. K. Carson, who began last year the development of a 10-acre Frankton ranch tract, grew a crop of tobacco, samples of which, sent to his old home near Lexington, Ky., were pronounced by tobacco experts as equal to Kentucky's best. The Kentuckians were impressed with the perfect leaves. Mr. Carson, who formerly raised tobacco in Kentucky, says no worms gave him worry in Hood River.

Cigars made from the homegrown tobacco by W. E. Sawyer, veteran local cigar maker, were distributed among friends. The smokers have an aroma that is appealing, and the flavor is declared fine, but the local smokers declare the straight local leaf too strong.

Circuit Court Monday
The quarterly session of circuit court will meet here Monday with Judge Wilson on the bench. Indications point to a very light docket. But a single criminal case is anticipated. That of the state vs. Robert and Melvin Andrews, Cascade Locks brothers, who were found guilty in justice court of moonshine operations but who appealed. Robert, the elder brother, received a fine of \$300 and was given six months in jail, while the younger brother was given a fine only.

No civil cases, it is said, will demand jury trial. The grand jury will be impaneled.
