## YOU WANT PARTIES? YOU HAD BETTER STUDY THEM

February 28, 1923. Hood River, Ore. The school authorities working for the best interests of the pupils encourage them to have regular and adequate sleep, and to do so. It is recommended that a good night's sleep be had. It is recommended that a good night's sleep be had.

The regulations governing high school parties, adopted by the board of directors of school district No. 3 and followed during the past year, are given here for the information of those interested. A. M. Cannon, Superintendent.

1. Each class in the high school shall be allowed one party per year to be held in the gymnasium of the high school under the immediate supervision of the high school principal and such teachers as he shall designate; and at such times and dates as may be designated by the city superintendent. Likewise, the high school student body may give a reception to new students and faculty members near the opening of the school year.

2. At least 48 hours before the time for a party the class advisors shall submit it to the high school principal for his inspection, and they shall forward any items or plans not thoroughly approved by him.

3. All high school parties shall be held on Friday or Saturday nights between the hours of 8 and 11 o'clock under the chaperonage of the high school faculty and in accord with the program approved by the high school principal, provided, however, that at least one hour of the evening must be devoted to some other form of amusement than dancing, and that dancing must not be indulged in more than one hour consecutively or more than two hours during the evening.

4. A class "clean-up" committee shall place the gymnasium in order by 1 o'clock of the day succeeding the party. The superintendent will withhold \$5 of class funds to guarantee that this janitor work will be properly done.

5. Because of the tendency to spend excessive amounts on music and refreshments, the board hereby limits the total expenditure for a party to \$25.

6. Parties held by high school students at other places than the gymnasium are not high school parties and should not be given recognition by teachers.

7. The above regulations do not cover the Junior-Senior reception.
