POISON OAK REMEDY GAINS POPULARITY. A medicine company, organized here for the purpose of distributing a cure for poison oak, although its activities were very modest for the year, is showing an expansion, the product having come into demand in various Northwestern sections, where the dreaded shrub thrives. The company has received orders from as far south as Myrtle Point and from logging districts of the Willamette Valley. The popularity of the remedy, which is really a derivative of the shrub itself and which is taken as an internal antidote, was largely gained last year when the Phoenix Utility Company's crews were attacked by the poison rash while clearing brushland where the oak grew luxuriantly. Unable to get relief from various external ointments, many of the men tried the internal remedy with success. The medicine company is planning an advertising campaign in districts where the poison grows and where annually at this season many are affected by the painful rash.
