APPLE PROSPECTS IN EAST ARE GOOD
 (Gordon G. Brown)
 A recent letter from Professor C. I. Lewis, editor of the American Fruit Grower magazine to the writer, discloses the fact that the east has excellent prospects for another good crop of apples this year. The damage done by the cold weather in March has proved to be much less than was first thought. The peach crop is large and the apple trees are well budded. Owing to the fact that the season is extremely late, Prof. Lewis looks for very good crops of all kinds. Of course the grower will realize that we will not know definitely what the eastern apple crop will be until June.
 "This is a year when Hood River must put forth its best efforts to secure tonnage and quality," says Prof. Lewis, and as the slang expression is "watch your culls,"
 Business conditions are much better. Salaries are being raised right along. Agriculture in the middle west is picking up very rapidly. The grain growers of that section found that their grain is worth \$500,000,000 more in the middle of March than the same grain was worth in January. These facts are encouraging in that better business conditions are reflected in better prices.

Rhododendrons Will Soon Bloom
 While spring is now far advanced in the high forested district as during the latter part of May last year, W. A. Langille, District Ranger Walcott and Fred Donnerberg, who returned last week from Lost Lake, report the surface of the highland summertime beauty spot still covered with thick ice and a blanket of snow about two feet deep. While the blossoming of rhododendrons was not noted to any degree last year until in June, the buds of the great expanse of this region are already showing a red tip. By May 10, it is expected, the rhododendrons will be in full bloom.

Highway Tourists Are Early
 The influx of tourists on the Columbia River Highway is nearly a month earlier than last season. Daily automobiles from Rocky Mountain and middle western states are seen passing to the west. Numerous cars, carrying California license plates and laden with camping equipment, have been noted.
