PHOENIX CAMP NOTES

O. B. Melton, member of a crew of the Continental Pipe Co., of Seattle, was slung from the pipeline bridge headlamps into the rapids of Hood river last week. Mr. Melton was engaged with a crew completing a section of wooden pipeline. He had lifted one of the steel rods used to encircle the 10-foot pipeline and lost his balance. Mr. Melton tried to save the heavy stay rod, which fell with him, but it pulled him to the bottom of a deep hole. Company men in the rope as he was being swept down stream.

Partial removal of the old log and concrete dam has resulted in excellent steelhead fishing far upstream, according to anglers. The old dam, abandoned last fall, is stubbornly resisting the onslaught of crews armed with dynamite. It has been blown out sufficiently, however, to permit the main flow of the stream to pass unobstructed, and the large game fish are able to pass freely up the river.

The new dam of the power concern is equipped with a fish way that passes through a huge pier. Sportsmen who have inspected it said that the new fish way will in no way retard the upstream progress of trout, steelhead or chinook salmon.

Fifteen J. W. W. employees of the Continental Pipe Co. left their jobs Friday. The men made no demands. Following a meeting they merely called for their time, shouldered their "turkey" and walked away.

James J. Forsman, veteran employe of the Pacific Power & Light Co., at Sunnyside, Wash., has been appointed to take charge of the new dam and headworks. A cottage has been erected for Mr. Forsman near the dam. The company will erect two new cottages for employes who will be stationed at the new plant, three miles down the Hood river. Ed Fewel, who has been connected with electric companies here for nearly 20 years, has been slated for the position of chief operator at the new plant.

A keen interest in baseball is being manifested by members of crews. The concrete workers' team Saturday defeated the electricians' team by a score of 27 to 20. Rooters for the two teams vied with each other in their support and it is declared that pockets of gay checks changed hands in the betting.

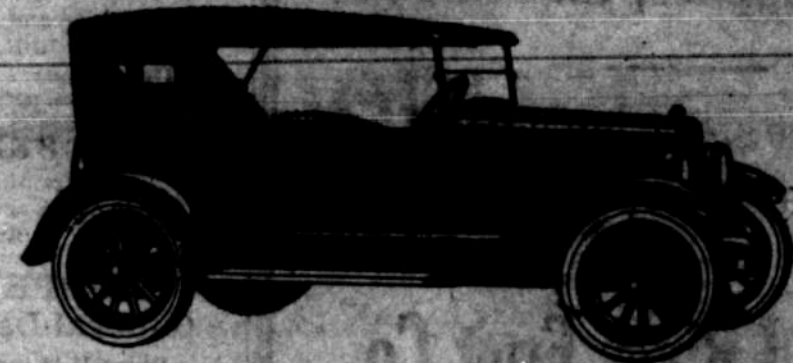
