L. R. ALEXANDER TO BENEFICIAL EVENT

"The past few weeks have started the spring auto show," says Earl Fenton of the Hood River Garage. "We find very few of the Buick models that we have recently delivered. Not only that but the owners of these beautiful cars are mighty proud of them. We have delivered every one of these models of Buick in the past two weeks and the demand for open models has been better than any past year. There is a great deal of interest in our coming auto show which will be held the 12th and 13th of May. We are preparing for a large attendance for that reason. The show itself will be not only very instructive but entertaining as well. Mr. Fenton of the Portland auto show fame, will deliver an afternoon and evening lecture both days, supplementing it with motion pictures. There will be a stripped Buick chassis as well as a cut away motor that is electrically operated. Mr. Fenton's talk is of interest to anyone owning a car, no matter what make. Mr. Nichols, the factory representative, will accompany Mr. Fenton in his lecture, showing the actual application of Mr. Fenton's lecture on a Buick car. The Buick factory on March 12 built the millionth car. Last month in one day over 1200 cars left the factory for dealers throughout the country.

Very few people realize the size of the automotive industry. Today the Buick factory covers 201 acres, employs over 15,000 men and has a total floor space of 4,198,750 square feet. The history of the Buick car starts in 1905, when the first car of this make was built. It still follows the famous Buick design in that it is still a valve-in-head motor. This has been brought up to the present day motor, which is highly developed. The new motor will be shown during the show in such a way that everyone who is mechanically inclined will be easily able to see every moving part function.

Strawberry Fertilization (By Gordon G. Brown)

In connection with the general fertilization program outlined by the writer earlier in the season, it is timely to suggest that this program be followed up by additional fertilization now. Those who are familiar with previous recommendations will recall that I have recommended a total application of 500 pounds per acre per year of the so-called 6-10-4 "mixed fertilizer." This consists of 6 per cent nitrogen, 10 per cent phosphoric acid and 4 per cent potash. The fertilizer is to be put on in two applications, one in early spring at the rate of 250 pounds per acre, and the balance in late summer after the topping season.

In addition to this program I am urging growers to use nitrate of soda at or near blossoming time at the rate of 100 to 150 pounds per acre. The purpose of this supplementary application is to stimulate growth and production. The writer feels that this is a valuable fertilizer because the potash and phosphoric acid applied in early spring as previously suggested, will insure good quality and firmness. It is a point thoroughly established locally that the largest and largest sized fruit are induced by nitrogen fertilization. The writer recommends nitrate of soda because it is the most quickly available and the cheapest.

Farmers Receive Sales Requests

As a result of publicity of the activity of the American Legion Post here calling him to task for seeking to promote sales of real estate to Japanese, W. G. Parmelee declares that his mail lately has been filled with letters from white residents in various parts of the state seeking to have him sell property to the Orientals. A number of the letters, Mr. Parmelee said, were from non-resident owners of local property, who express a willingness to sell to Japanese before the legislative enactment, which will prohibit such transfers, goes into effect May 25.

"One of the letters," Mr. Parmelee said, "was from the owner of a large ranch in the Newberg vicinity, who declares that he feels no lack of patriotism in disposal of property to Japanese."

Valley Pleases Army Officials

Hood River apple blossoms won the notice of a party of high army officials who motored up from Portland Sunday with Judge Chas. H. Carey. The visitors were: Maj. Gen. Mason M. Patrick, chief of the air service in the United States army, of Washington, D. C., and his aide, Maj. H. A. Dargatzis, Col. Chas. Van Way, of Portland, president of the United States Spruce Division Corporation.
The visitors were driven here by W. J. Stevenson, who was a sergeant in the army and who drove for Gen. Patrick for 23 months.

Apple Growers Get Praise

Appraiser McKittrick of the Spokane Federal Land Bank, here Saturday last, after a tour of orchards, owners of which have applied for loans, stated that mid-Columbia fruit sections appear in excellent shape, despite the depressed apple marketing conditions of the past few years.
"Mr. McKittrick told me," says Arg. Guignard, secretary-treasurer of the Hood River Federal Farm Loan Association, "that the fruit growers take better care of their orchards than any other class of farmers."

Canning Course to be Given

To increase the fruit and vegetable canning facilities of the state of Washington, and to promote the canning industry of this district, thereby vastly enlarging the market for Washington's \$50,000,000 fruit, berry and vegetable crop, is the purpose of a new complete four-year course in the commercial canning and curing of fruits and vegetables, which will be given by the University of Washington College of Fisheries, beginning next fall.

North Bank Graveling Done

R. S. Haselton, of Underwood, who has the contract for graveling a seven-mile unit of the North Bank Highway from Underwood to the west end of Blingon, stated Saturday, while here on business, that he would start his trucks this week. The Rajotte-Winters Co., engaged in cutting a new grade of the road from the west side of the Columbia canyon, just opposite this city, has finished the most difficult of the work and will have the unit between Underwood and Blingon completed within a few weeks.
