Application of Calyx Spray Important
 (By F. M. Green)
 All growers should understand that for the control of codling moth the calyx spray is of greatest importance and therefore no grower should contemplate omitting it from the spray program. So far as the state horticultural law is concerned, spraying for codling moth is just as compulsory as for any other pest of disease.

For the 1920-21 Season our average price net to the Grower for all Apples handled from this District—all varieties, grades and sizes down to and including 252's—was

\$1.49 per box.

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Our returns this Season will be published as soon as completed and will be relatively as good.

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
