(Continued From First Page) Mr. Durfee ended his talk with the quotation of the following poem written by an English officer of the great war: 'Ye that have faith to look with fearless eyes Upon the tragedy of a world at strife And know that out of death and night Shall rise the dawn of ampler life. Behold, whatever anguish rends the world, That God has given you a priceless power, To live in these great times and have in freedom's crowning hour, That ye may tell your sons, who see High in the heavens, their heritage, I saw the powers of darkness put to flight, I saw the morning break, Judge Wilson developed further the theme set by Mr. Durfee. He declared that Americans must give sober thought to their problems of government, if they maintain the nation. The people must consider their laws as binding on the individual citizen, and in a law is made today and broken tomorrow, the transgressors, if they escaped grand jury indictment, paying themselves on the back and making a parade in their action as though a smart trick had been performed. There is a need in the land of that spirit that relies on an almighty power, he said.
