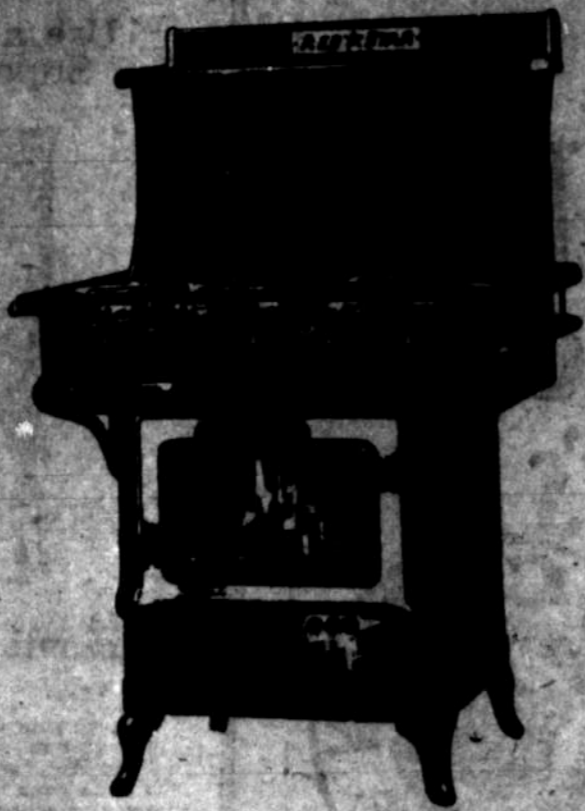

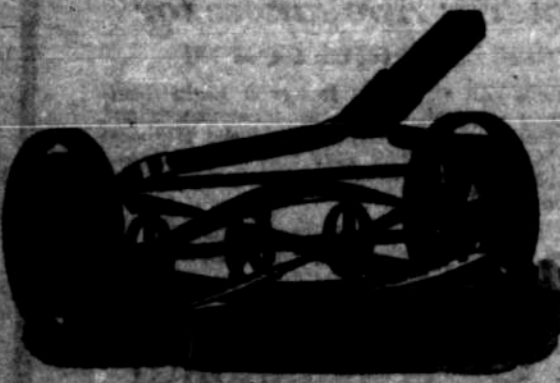

### WIYEAST CLUB

The Wiyeast Club trip of May 6 to party proceeded by auto to the beginning of the Skyline Trail about a mile beyond the Mt. Hood postoffice. The three-mile climb to the top of the hill over a good Forest Service trail was an excellent conditioner for the summer mountain climbing. The trail led through fir and oak woods most of the way, with numerous open lookout points affording the views up and down the valley. Long Prairie, a grassy opening in the woods at the top of the hills where a rangers' camp is located, was reached about noon. Lunch was eaten here beside the headwaters of Neal creek, with hemlock and fir needles for tablecloths. Considerable snow was found in sheltered and shady spots in the vicinity of Long Prairie and snowfall signs were the order of the day. 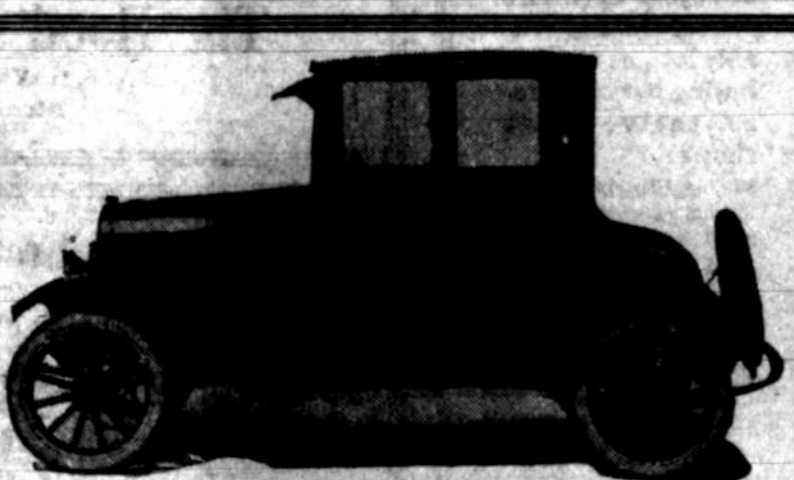

trail south from Long Prairie through the party to Rim Rock, an open rocky point on the hillside overlooking the valley to the level of the Hood River. An immense view of the Hood River valley, Mt. Hood, and the surrounding country, and around the north, Mr. Adams, Bainter and St. Nelson were all in plain sight.

On the return trip the Wiyeast party left the Trails Club at 10:30 a. m. The Trails Club people had to get an early start back to Portland, and so were obliged to take the shortest trail down, crossing the last and of the trip over Bald Butte. The scenery was not so profuse on Bald Butte and this part of the trip was very enjoyable. The view from Bald Butte takes in practically the whole valley and a good many points of interest. Those who did not go missed a rare opportunity to see an unusually fine collection of beautifully colored Mount Hood pictures, a great many of which were taken in the very places that very few Hood River people have ever seen. Mr. Rockhold has a first-hand knowledge of the natural history, as well as the topography, of the Mount Hood region, which gave a wide variety of interest to his remarks. An attractive feature of the lecture was the reading by Mrs. Rockhold of appropriate quotations from well known authors to accompany certain of the slides.

The Hood River Post of the American Legion, which had a meeting the same evening, adjourned in time to give the members an opportunity to see part of the pictures. Mr. Rockhold showed a good many slides of the region traversed by the Legion Club, as well as of the newly opened up Eden Park country where the Masamas and Wiyeast Club are to have a camp this summer.

The next trip of the Wiyeast Club will be another joint trip with the Trails Club, this time to St. Peter's Dome on the Columbia River Highway May 20. This will be an all day trip, leaving the Hotel Oregon at 7 a. m., and returning in the late afternoon. Although the total distance is only five miles, yet there is a good deal of climbing, much of it fairly steep, and it is probably equivalent to a 10-mile trip on easy ground. It is absolutely necessary for members to wear hob-nail or cables in their boots, and cotton gloves should be worn to protect the hands in climbing. This trip will afford excellent practice for mountain climbing, and the climbers will be rewarded by fine views from the saddle back, about 200 feet below the summit of the Dome, which is the highest point that can be reached. Members should bring lunch, drinking cup and canteen, if possible; also club buttons with name written on in India ink.

The transportation arrangements will be the same as those for the last trip, which ended on 10 furnished free transportation to all members of the party. Those who wish to make the trip will please register with Joe Hackett at Kelly's furniture department next Friday, May 18, stating whether they need transportation or can furnish it, and if so, for how many. ### STUDEBAKER FILMS ON TOMORROW NIGHT

A cast of thousands of people, hundreds of machines almost human in the operations they perform, and a \$20,000,000 setting provide the background for the film, "The Story of an Automobile" to be exhibited at the high school auditorium beginning at 8 p. m. tomorrow.

This film was produced under the direction of the United States Department of Commerce in cooperation with the Studebaker Corporation and will be shown in all parts of the world.

The scenes are laid in the new \$20,000,000 Studebaker plant at South Bend, Ind.

This romance of modern manufacturing shows as a commonplace happening the wonders of motor car manufacture such as hydraulic pressure tamping a four ton hammer as though it were light as a feather, and this optic hammer forming white hot bars of the toughest steel into automobile parts; molten metal flowing from a cupola spout like water from a faucet; a vast storeroom served by two traveling cranes which transfer materials from the loading docks to any floor in 60 seconds; a single machine which drills 68 holes in the engine block at one operation—this block being held by metal straps so that it will fit in the machine in only one position, the correct one, which helps to explain the perfect interchangeability of Studebaker parts.

The story is a fascinating portrayal of the miracles of twentieth century manufacture; it will interest anyone who ever rode in an automobile. After seeing it, you will appreciate why the representatives of 14 nations after viewing it in Washington asked that it be exhibited in their respective countries.

### A. W. WOODY'S FUNERAL HELD SUNDAY

Funeral services for A. W. Woody, 78 and Civil war veteran who died suddenly following a paralytic stroke at his Oak Grove orchard home Saturday morning, was held at the First Christian church Sunday afternoon. Rev. J. C. Hanna, officiating. Interment followed at Idlewild cemetery. Mr. Woody served in the Union Army with a Tennessee Cavalry regiment. A native of Georgia, Mr. Woody came here six years ago with his family from Clarke county, Washington, where he had resided for 20 years. He is survived by his widow, seven sons and four daughters. Members of the American Legion were pall bearers. At the grave a

squad from Company C fired a volley and taps were sounded. Grand Army ritualistic services were observed by Gandy Post.

In addition to his widow Mr. Woody is survived by the following children: James F., B. C., W. M., A. H., T. R. and P. B. Woody; Mrs. Nora Kirkpatrick and Mrs. Helen Taylor, all of Hood River; Mrs. Carrie M. Tate, of O'Fallon, Wash.; B. H. Woody, of Centalla, Wash., and Mrs. Mollie Christensen, of La Center.

Aaron Washington Wood was born in Lumpkin county, Georgia, June 3, 1845, growing up to manhood there. He was married to Mary A. Barnes December 31, 1868. Some years later he was called to mourn for his wife and mother. He was married July 7, 1878, to Mary Oveline McDonald. In 1887 he moved to Kansas and some years later moved to Washington, remaining until about five years ago when he moved to Oregon and located in Hood River county.

February 5, 1894, he responded to his country's call and enlisted in Company G, 10th Regiment, Tennessee Cavalry, where he gave his best service. He was mustered out August 1, 1865. Mr. Woody had been in poor health for the past year.
