Proper Thinning Aids Codling Moth Control

Many growers in the Northwest have found that proper thinning of the apples very materially assists in controlling codling moth and growers in the Hood River district who have had trouble with the codling moth during past seasons can get much benefit if they will recognize the importance of this point.

Many growers also instruct their thinners to save the wormy apples which are later destroyed by either burying or crushing. Apples cut from trees and containing worms possess usually sufficient food to permit their full development, and they cause later giving trouble in the second brood.

Codling Moth Situation

Up to the present time where growers have been following the recommended sprays, worm control has been very good. The prevailing cool weather has, however, materially retarded the emergence of the moths and an examination of trunks and soil immediately around the base of the tree brings out the fact that there are still many moths to issue.
