WASCO CHERRIES AND PRUNES ARE FINE

The Wasco county cherry crop, the harvest of which has begun, will be characterized by an excellent yield of fine quality, according to Paul McKercher, mid-Columbia representative of Spobel & Day, New York fruit buyers, who are handling a considerable tonnage of black fruit which will be forwarded in refrigerator cars. Mr. McKercher says that the prune crop of the Wasco county sections, too, will yield heavily. The prunes will be packed in small boxes, called suitcases, and shipped east in the green

state. Because of the shortage of prunes in Washington districts, growers are expecting good prices. Mr. McKercher reported last week that the Mosier Bing and Lambert cherry crop had been sold to F. E. Nellis & Co., of Chicago, for 10 cents per pound. Dufur black cherries, he stated, were sold to P. J. Stadlerman for 7 1/2 cents per pound.

Wasco county orchardists were short of harvest help and appeals were sent here last week to secure any surplus of strawberry pickers that might be available. The harvest of berries, however, was at the peak and many growers were short of pickers here.

The security behind the bonds of the Columbia Gorge Hotel
