**H. R. A. VINEGAR CO. IS MAKING PECTIN**

After experiments extending over some time, the Hood River Apple Vinegar Co. has begun the manufacture on a large scale of fruit pectin, secured by a special process from the huge quantities of apple pomace left when the juice is pressed from the fruit for cider and vinegar. The new department of the vinegar plant, the largest in the Northwest, will greatly increase the annual output and business of the concern and result in a permanent payroll for the city. The pomace is dried by a special process and the pectin later extracted after water is added and the product put through certain phases. It is reduced by means of a huge vacuum pan, which is also used in concentrating cider.

The new product is used in jelly-making. Housewives have formerly been unable to make jellies from such fruits as strawberries and cherries, because of the lack of pectin. By the addition of the new product, the finest of jellies may be made without boiling away much of the flavor and color of the product.

The product, bottled, each bottle in a handsomely colored box, and these packed in cartons, is at once ready for distribution by local grocers. Already housewives are finding it invaluable in their jelly-making. It is predicted that it will become indispensable to the housewife. Those who have used it here are high in their praises. Each bottle is accompanied by a book of tried recipes.

In this issue of The Glacier, W. A. Bookler, chemist of the company, who had much to do with perfecting the product, will begin a series of articles on jelly making. These articles should prove a great help to Hood River Valley housewives in their year's canning and jelly making. Mr. Bookler, too, will tell just what pectin is and how it is made.

**U. P. Has Many Stockholders**

The Union Pacific System of Railroads has 51,016 stockholders, according to a statement issued recently by C. R. Gray, president. Approximately 48 per cent of the stockholders are women and most of the stockholders are persons of moderate means, says Mr. Gray. The average holding, according to the statement, is 63 shares of a par value of \$100 each. No one person, firm, corporation or institution owns as much as two per cent of the capital stock, the statement adds. Stockholders reside in every state in the Union and in Alaska, Canal Zone, Guam, Hawaii and Philippine Islands. "Thus," says Mr. Gray, "Union Pacific stock, like a country's trade, follows the flag. This widespread distribution conclusively answers the statement that the railroads are owned and controlled by a few persons. To an extent not generally recognized, the railroads are owned by the public. This subject comes home to every household when it is considered that life insurance policy holders and savings bank depositors are partners in the operation and development of our railways."

**Miss Grace Edgington Honored**

Miss Grace Edgington, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Jesse Edgington and acting dean of women at the University of Oregon, left last week for Chicago, where she will be initiated into Phi Beta Phi. **RASPBERRY MEN NEED MORE PICKERS**

Wilson Pike, raspberry grower of the Pine Grove district, and West Side berry men were vainly seeking pickers Saturday. The hundreds of Lower Valley harvest hands, Mr. Pike said, have left, and in the Upper Valley the berry harvest, the fruit going to canneries, will last for 10 days more. Mr. Pike sent a call to Portland for help. "Unless I can get pickers this week," said Mr. Pike, "I stand to lose a large quantity of raspberries. The yield of my vines, three years old and just coming into bearing, is fine. The fruit, shipped to The Dalles, is bringing 10 cents per pound."

**Pollination Budding Begun**

What is considered one of the biggest moves toward building up of cherry production in the Wasco county orchard districts was gotten under way last Monday when every orchardist of the community who expressed a desire for it had his trees budded with pollinizers. W. S. Nelson, head of the horticultural and agricultural bureau of The Dalles-Wasco County Chamber of Commerce, believes that the work will eventually bring thousands of dollars to the county.

The budding work has been pooled, and expert men are doing the budding on a contract basis.

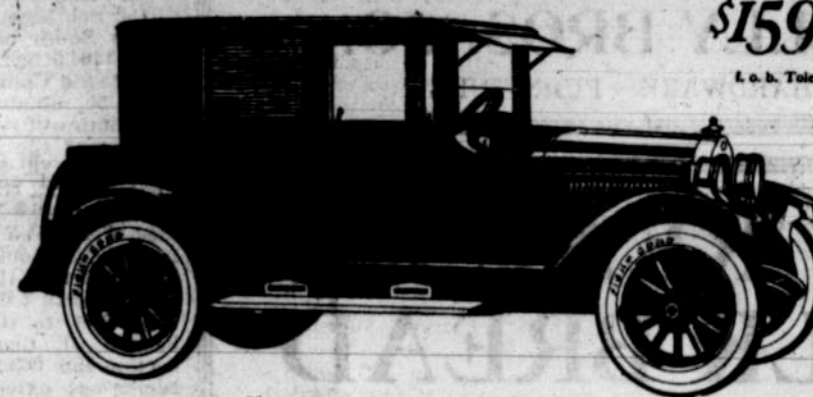
