The chief speakers were: A. Abbott, editor of Christian Evangelist, of St. Louis, Mo.; Traver Harrison, of Christian Standard, of Cincinnati, O., and Cynthia Pearl Mann, of the United Christian Mission Society, of St. Louis, Mo., a writer of note on Sunday school methods.
