Up on the northwest and west bas of Mount Hood last week and this, an approximate 100 Portland and Hood River folk, according to reports brought back by C. W. Melcher, Chiengo man and father-in-law of C. E Graves, secretary of the Wiyeast Club of this city, are enjoying the life of near gods. The recreationists, mem-bers of the Mazama and Wiyeast Clubs, have been occupying Paradise and Eden Parks. The Mazamas moved into the isolated meadowland the first of last week.
