## **WORKING CONDITION** IN KITCHEN BAD

we call a foot candle and it is no uncommon practice to bring the illumination in a factory as high as 20 to 30 foot candles. In the kitchen, however, the average light intensity is from two, to three foot candles. By comparing this with the lighting in a properly illuminated factory we believe that there are many housekeapers whose work in the kitchen, the workshop of the nation, is made harder and more inconvenient than necessary. "Right now we are trying to arrive at some estimate on the number of people who have to wear glasses through eye-strain caused from lights which are left, unknowingly, too dim or have a reflector which does not spread out the light rays in the best possible way. We have found many kitchen lamps hanging low from a drop cord without a shade. Doctors say that such a light is a constant menace to eyesight, good production, and cheerful working conditions.

In a disease of this nature prevention is much better than cure, for it is obvious that once the embryo are in the general circulation it is too late. The farmer who raises hogs should be educated regarding the dan-ger of feeding the uncooked offal or rats. Piggeries should be as rat-proof as possible, so that pigs themselves cannot kill and eat rodents.
