MAN SHOT, ROBBED, ON THE HIGHWAY

With a bullet wound in his left arm, Joe Bellenger, transient, appeared at the police station Monday morning, seeking aid of officers in apprehending a man named Ted, who, he declared, shot him on the Columbia River highway about 430 and robbed him of \$45.

According to Bellenger's story, he met his assailant, whose last name he did not know, Sunday and arranged to ride in his automobile to Spokane. Bellenger was to pay for gasoline for the journey.

"Late Sunday night at a filling station I bought gasoline," said Bellenger, "and the man saw my money, mostly small bills. Just this side of Westport we had a blowout. After he had replaced the tire he suddenly struck me with a wrench, the blow landing on my neck instead of the back of my head. Partially stunned I turned to protect myself when the man drew his pistol and shot me. I fell forward and laid still as if dead, and he evidently thought he had killed me. He reached into my coat pocket, took my pocketbook, and then jumped into his car speeding off to the east."

Bellenger described his assailant as reddish, about five feet three inches tall, with high cheek bones. He estimated his age at 22 years. He drove a Ford car, with yellow headlight lenses, and a Washington license, the first figures being 16.

William Jones, 460 East Davis street, Portland, picked up the injured man and brought him to the city. Authorities immediately wired officers east of here to watch all highways and ferries.

Sheriff Johnson left by automobile Tuesday for Pe Ell, Wash., to seek the record and name of "Ted." Bellenger and "Ted" had formerly worked together at Pe Ell.

TUBER INSPECTION PROVES VALUABLE

County Fruit Inspector W. J. Kocken, who also has charge of federal inspection of fruit and vegetable shipments originating here, Tuesday cited an instance of the benefits that accrue to growers who make shipments that have been certified by federal authorities.

"C. J. Gordon, of Parkdale, recently shipped two carloads of Burbank potatoes," said Mr. Kocken, "to a San Francisco dealer. Tuesday he received a telegram that the tubers were badly damaged by freezing. Communication was established with the San Francisco office of the federal inspection department. It was ascertained that one car of the potatoes had been diverted to Stockton. Investigation showed only near few sacks near the door, frosted. The other car had been diverted to Los Angeles. Without further explanation of his original message, the San Francisco dealer settled with Mr. Gordon on his own weights."

BOYS WANTED FOR AUTO THEFT ESCAPE

Two Portland boys who gave the names, Jack White and Jack Vance, the former claiming he was 17 and the other 15, escaped from the city jail Sunday afternoon some time by mortising a heavy wooden beam around a bar in a partition between the main jail corridor and a room utilized for prisoners who might be ill or women. Officers believe the boys were aided by some local man or boy who supplied them with a chisel.

The Vance boy said he was a member of the Whitney boys' chorus, which was recently stranded in Canada. They were apprehended Saturday night by Harry Gross as they were attempting to steal gasoline in his yard. Officer Sloan when he searched them found a revolver and a quantity of ammunition on them.

SUGGESTION ON THE TAX QUESTION

There is now before congress an amendment to the federal constitution which provides for taxing the income from future issues of state and municipal bonds, by the federal government.

It also provides that states may tax the incomes from future issues of government bonds that are owned within their borders. In plain English this means that the income derived from future issues of bonds being tax-free as in the past, would hereafter be subject to taxation in the same manner as income earned in any manner whatsoever.

Commenting on necessity for doing away with tax-exempt bonds in order to encourage the investment and loaning of capital in productive enterprise and agriculture, E. D. Chasell, secretary of the Farm Mortgage Bankers Association of America, says:

"Wealthy individuals subject to a federal income tax of 50 per cent to 58 per cent, are buying 5 per cent, 5½ per cent and 6 per cent tax-free securities now, at prices as high as 120 per cent. A 5 per cent security, tax-exempt, in the possession of a person receiving an income of a million dollars a year yields him as much net income as a taxable security paying an annual interest rate of 11 per cent."

"For the last five years great difficulty has been experienced in obtaining capital for railroads, for industrial or development purposes, for the reason that the wealthy owners of such capital are laying their wealth away in tax-free investments. That condition will grow worse and worse as the years go by and each year the demand for government aid will become stronger and stronger as capital is lured away into tax-free securities."

"More than a billion dollars is now diverted every year from agriculture and business to tax-free bonds. This is a knife that cuts both ways. It deprives industry of the needed capital and it shifts heavier taxes upon agriculture and business. If that leak is stopped by the passage of the amendment agriculture and business will thrive as never before.—Pacific Manufacturer.

News of the Golfers

There are some famous golf links in this country. Probably none of them are so widely known as St. Andrews in Scotland, but destined to be still more famous are those of Salome,

laid out by Dick Wick Hall, known as the Greasewood Golf Links.

"The folks who see the lynx," says Mr. Hall in a special golf edition of the Salome Sun, "all say nobody never saw anything like it nowhere. The course is just a little over twenty-three (23) miles around and all hazards and bunkers are natural—no artificial ones needed. Some Eastern folks spend the season here a purpose just to play around it once—and some others who have been here several seasons ain't ever got around it yet. Players are warned to use maps and NOT to get off the far a ways between the holes. Coyote and rabbit holes DON'T COUNT. Good guides who know the course can be obtained at the BLUE ROCK INN and caddies and horses and caissons, also tents and camping outfits, can be leased by the week, month or season, provided a deposit is put up and ALL CADDIES AND HORSES MUST BE PAID FOR."

It can be gathered from the foregoing forward that a round of golf on the Greasewood Golf Lynx is something more than an adventure. It is a career.

A map of the "lynx" accompanies the description with an attempt to bring out the topographical features of the country in which the players may disport themselves. The distance between the fifth and sixth holes, following the saw-tooth top of Table Mountain, is given as 538 rods. This is what Mr. Hall calls a "far-away" not to be confounded with fairway. The player who can make a drive from the fourth hole at Buzzard's Roost into to any region approximating vicinity to the fifth hole, 537 rods, is qualified to play anywhere. The ninth hole is in Death Valley and the tenth at Apache Peak, the apex of Funeral Mountain, distance not shown on the map.

Players from the eighth to the ninth; from the fifteenth to the sixteenth; and thence to the seventeenth, are warned by a legend, "Look out for bandits here and always go armed. Do not camp here alone at night. Either go on to Lazy L Ranch, (the eleventh hole), or back to Sheep Springs Cabin (hole No. 1) for the night."
