LETTERS ASK AID FOR GERMAN KIDDIES

The committee appointed to raise funds for the starving children of Germany is making the solicitation by mail. Sixteen hundred dollars is being asked from Hood River county. The local committee decided to address letters to several hundred local people whose names appear on most of the charitable subscriptions in the valley. This plan was followed to save time for the committee and also to avoid the appearance of a drive. It is the desire to make the contribution absolutely voluntary.

In addition to the individuals who are addressed by letter, the leading organizations of the valley, churches, lodges, granges, are to be asked to make a contribution from their organizations which shall be raised in any manner the organization may devise.

The canvass is being sponsored by leading men of the state and nation and there is no doubt as to the acute need of the children of Germany.

The committee asks that anyone, whether they receive a letter or not, leave a contribution at either bank. It is hoped that a large number may respond and that no one will feel that his gift is too small—even though he can give but the fraction of a dollar. On the other hand, everyone is urged to do his best.

The committee is composed of the following: E. O. Blanchard, chairman, Truman Butler, W. H. Boddy, J. H. Fredrick, Mrs. C. A. Bell, Mrs. J. E. Slade, Mrs. Wm. Munroe, Rev. R. A. Hutchinson, Hugh O. Ball, Mrs. M. Mrs. A. G. Lewis and A. M. Cannon.

The letter is as follows: "May we take you behind the scenes and let you listen to the meeting of a group of local men and women whose names appear upon this letter? They are discussing relief for the starving children of Germany. Some of them are frankly pessimistic. 'There is such antagonism to Germany,' observes another. 'The rich men of Germany are hoarding their gold marks in this and other countries.' All these things and more were said. 'And yet, as every informed person knows,' they said, 'the children are starving.'

"Then it was discovered that there was not a man or woman about the table who did not want, in spite of the objections interposed, to do something for the helpless little ones of Germany. 'The whole discussion was finally concluded when someone said in effect: 'While many people may be deterred from giving for the reasons mentioned and while a general opinion may not be so unanimous, there is a group of people in this valley so big in mind and heart that they would gladly feed their own enemies if they hungered! But these are not enemies. We never made war on children!'

"Americans, as magnanimous as they are patriotic, are going to feed the starving children of Germany with food brought in the United States and distributed in feeding stations operated by the American Quakers under the American flag.

"You are one of the selected group of compassionate ones to whom this appeal is being sent. Won't you hear the cry of the children? 'Send your check to either bank, marked 'Children's Relief.' Thank you."

FAMED OPERA STARS COMING TO PORTLAND

When the Chicago Civic Opera Company comes to Portland Monday, March 10, to present the first of four operas to be given there, it will bring to that city some of the most famous operatic stars of all time.

The names of the principals in the most dramatic operas in the world; every home in America—Mary Gardou, the incomparable; Feodor Chaliapin, greatest of Russian basses; Rosa Raisa, recognized as one of the foremost dramatic sopranos in the world; Charles Marshall, noted American tenor; George Baklanoff, man of mystery in the realm of music; Giorgio Polacco, famous musical director, and many more.

Two special trains of 12 cars each will bring the organization to Portland. The company is carrying 325 persons on its present tour. The orchestra consists of 50 artists with two conductors and three assistant conductors; the chorus has 55 members, and the corps de ballet has 18 dancers.

Properties worth hundreds of thousands of dollars are carried so that the productions can be staged as the Chicago Civic Opera Company insists they must be staged. The properties have been carefully selected from the \$6,000,000 stock owned by the company in Chicago.

Mary Gardou will appear in Portland in two operas—"Cleopatra," which created a sensation when it was first presented in Chicago a short time ago, and "Salome," for years her favorite. "Cleopatra" will be given as the opening performance on Monday night, March 10, while "Salome" will be given Wednesday afternoon, March 12.

Feodor Chaliapin completely won hearts of Portland music lovers when he visited there last spring on a nationwide concert tour, and his advent in opera is awaited with keen anticipation. Chaliapin will appear in what is probably his most famous role, "Boris Godunov," the night of Tuesday, March 11. DIRECT OPPOSITION TO PARK DEVELOPS

Direct opposition to plans of the city council to purchase a 37-acre tract on the Columbia River highway west of town for use as an auto park and recreational grounds for children was manifested Friday when a petition was circulated among taxpayers. The petitioners, who were signing in numbers, urged that the council forego the plans.

The petition declared the existing park capable of handling the motor tourists who visit here. Proceeds from the auto camp grounds, it was declared, should be utilized to pay off taxes.

Montgomery Utilizes Marketed Apples
B. J. Montgomery, Middle Valley rancher, whose apple crop was severely damaged by hail last fall, has spent the winter months utilizing the fruit, which would have been discounted on the commercial market, for mince-meat, apple butter, jelly and syrup manufacture. Mr. Montgomery, with members of his family furnishing the operating force, has made the conditions in quantities. He has supplied local and eastern and central Oregon cities with the same.

"I find my demand growing in eastern Oregon," said Mr. Montgomery, who returned last week from a sales trip through the eastern part of the state.

Miss Hawkes Designs Plate
Miss Helen Hawkes, of Hood River, designed the plate for the senior table in the art department of the Oregon Agricultural College, under the direction of J. L. Fairbanks, professor of art. Miss Hawkes is a senior in vocational education.

The design consists of an embodiment of the "Lady of the Fountain," a figure dear to the students, within a wreath. Each year the senior class has a special table made to order, which is exclusively for the members of the class.

The plate for the 1924 table top was cast in aluminum bronze at the college foundry. Twenty-eight pounds of metal were required for the casting.

Mrs. A. F. S. Steele, wife of the manager of the Apple Growers Association, last week received a message telling of the death of her father, Henry C. Wise, at his home at Auburn, N. Y.
