WEYGANDT TELLS OF WEEK IN PORTLAND

Mark Weygant, just back Saturday from a week in Portland, where he was in constant attendance at the exhibits placed by the Chamber of Commerce, the Hood River County Game Protective Association and the American Legion post, declared himself utterly fagged out by city life.

"I am used to the high altitudes and the out of doors," said Mr. Weygant, "and it was too hot for me down in the metropolis. The long evening hours, too, were too much for me. I was famished for lack of sleep. It is easier on me to get out and spend the day climbing a mountain than to stand around in a room of the city all day."

Mr. Weygant declared that his week's experience in Portland was profitable. He returned with some interesting suggestions for features of the annual Mount Hood climb of the American Legion post next July.

"While in the city," said Mr. Weygant, "I had a motorcycle man, who has participated in some of the thrilling motorcycle contests of the Pacific coast for a number of years, had a booth near our exhibit," said Mr. Weygant, "and he was interested in the Legion post. After he had talked over the event he agreed to bring one of his highpowered motor bikes up to the glacial snow fields next July and try me out on skills. I propose to let him tow me, at the end of a rope, on my skis over the vast snowfields. He is going to try and see if he can't go so fast that I will not be able to keep my feet. Mr. Bennett proposes to come up soon and go over the ground with me. He participates annually in motorcycle events at Rainier national park. These contests attract thousands. If the motorcycle-ski feature materializes it should be a drawing card for the Legion climb."

Mr. Weygant said he spent the most of his time at the Portland auditorium answering questions. He says he found a group of Cascade girls keenly interested in the mountain country. After they had heard of the stories of Eden park and had seen the pictures of glorious mountain meadows, alfalfa with blossoms, he says they decided to invest in the park next summer with a view toward establishing a summer lodge.

"One of the most interesting hours for me in Portland," says Mr. Weygant, "was spent with about a dozen school girls. They arrived and greeted me by calling, 'Hello, Mark.' It appears that they had seen me in a moving picture of a Mount Hood climb. They wanted first hand information, in order to write a story in class work. I started them on the Columbia River highway and carried them, after arrival in Hood River, up over the Mount Hood Loop to the Legion camp and the open snow fields. They all declared they were going to make the trip some time and then write a real story."
