## MR. JOHNSON CELEBRATES BIRTHDAY

Members of Canby Post, G. A. R., were called together at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jonathan Johnson, Tuesday, March 4, to celebrate Mr. Johnson's 76th birthday. Comrade Johnson is the youngest man in the department of Oregon, G. A. R., to have enlisted in 1861. After the war he served seven years in the regular army. He saw service on the plains in Indian warfare under General Custer and for two years was a soldier in South Carolina, when it was necessary for government troops to keep the Ku Klux in subjection in the southern states.

Mr. Johnson belongs to a family members of which participated in all the wars of our country since colonial days. His father commanded a Kentucky regiment in the Mexican war. His father was a first cousin to the Confederate general, Albert Sidney Johnson, who commanded the Confederate army at Shiloh and was killed in the first day's fight. Comrade Johnson is probably the best drilled man in the department of Oregon today.

Comrade James S. Nottingham, who served in the 70th Illinois in the Civil war, was a guest of the party. A splendid dinner was served. The birthday cake, built by the hostess, decorated with flags, was pronounced by all to be excellent. Comrade Nottingham is an entertaining conversationalist. He is full of anecdotes of Lincoln, Lincoln jokes and anecdotes of the days when they sang the refrain:

"Then move your families westward and health you will enjoy in the state of Illinois."
