But let us not again be hysterical, and lunge blindly in the opposite direction, with just as disastrous results. Most occurences are the results. Most occurences are the results. Most occurences are the result of facta, and the situation in apples is no exception. We first had a small supply to fill a growing demand; we had low freight rates and general prosperity. Now we face a tremendous overproduction, exorbitant freight rates and world-wide economic conditions that are also the results of poor sowing, which upset all lines of business including apples.

Passing by economic aspects and centering our attention upon apples alone, and Hood River apples in particular, a few considerations of facts may save us some worry.

While the Northwest apple industry has got to be shaken down and the weeds that were sowed 10 years ago have got to be pulled out, Hood River is really sitting pretty. Fortunately, we grow largely Spitzenburgs and Newtowns, two standard, steady, high-class varieties. After the wheat land, and the rock land, the dry land and the swampy land, and all the other enormous tracts that have been planted, brought into consumption and now facing ruin, are relegated to the past, as they inexitably will be, Hood River will still stand with a production of good, reliable, standard stuff. Hood River is an apple growing district by nature, adapted by environment, location, climate and soil to the commercial production of apples, while much of the present producing areas in the Northwest are not.

We have reached the crisis in the struggle of surviyal of the fittest. And Hood River is, by natural endowment, among the fittest. Therefore, let us take courage, and not give up hope. There is no getting around the fact that apples are apples, and while the markets are swamped with Wagners, Romes, Jonathans and other more or less inferior varieties, the market for good apples is spoiled. But much of the area producing such stuff is being starved out by these disastrous seasons, and if Hood River was planted to Wagners like the Spokane valley, or to enormous areas of Romes such as are harvested in deadly quantities around Walla Walla, Milton, Freewater and other districts, there would be nothing to do but recognize a mistake. But we raise good apples; we can, if we will, put them up in good, standard fashion, and there is no reason why Hood River sould not be right on hand with a big production to enjoy the legitimate profits of sane production after the present shake-down and readjustment has become past history. has moved—the new k cation is 908 12th

Martha, the other day, while visiting the city, fell against a concrete curb, injuring her chest. The old woman, one of the most picturisque figures of this section of the state, has many friends among the whites, and white women of the city visit her frequently carrying dainties to her sick bed. During winter months he made perilous journeys in his frail craft, threading the ice floes. Some 30 years ago Martha Aleck, accompanied by two small children, was panied by two small children, was crossing the river in a canoe. The wash from a passing steamer caused the small boat to founder. The Indian woman, grasping a child under each arm, treaded water. Her predicament was not immediately observed from the steamer. When she was finally seen in distress and a small boat launched for her rescue, it was discovered that the two babies had been drowned. Martha, it is said, by those who are close to her, never recovered the heart break inflicted by the tragedy.
