Notice of Street Improvement West Oak Street
Pursuant to the order of the Common Council contained in Ordinance No. 658 of the City of Hood River, Oregon, passed by the Common Council April 21, 1924, and approved by the Mayor on the 24th day of April, 1924, notice is hereby given that the undersigned City Recorder will receive bids for the following improvement:
Oak Street and Cascade Avenue from the west line of Ninth Street on Oak Street west to the end of the pavement on Cascade Avenue and Columbia River Highway which is about 96 feet west of the east line of Nineteenth Street in the City of Hood River, Oregon, by constructing and laying down thereon by the west line of Ninth Street west to the intersection with the center line of Cascade Avenue, a concrete pavement 18 feet in width, being 9 feet on either side of the center line of said portion of said Oak Street, and by constructing and laying down thereon from the intersection of the center lines of Oak Street and Cascade Avenue west to said pavement a concrete pavement 16 feet in width, being 8 feet on either side of the center line of said portion of Cascade Avenue.
All work incidental to the construction and laying down of said pavement, such as grading and constructing water drains, shall be done if any such work is needed. The position, dimensions, location and manner of constructing or making each part of said improvements shall be strictly in accordance with the plans and specifications of the City Engineer, which are the standard specifications of the State Highway Department for concrete pavement.
Sealed proposals for the work will be received at my office up to 8 o'clock p. m., May 5th, 1924, and the Common Council will at its next regular meeting after the completion of the publication of this notice, to-wit: On the 9th day of May, 1924, at the Council Chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m., proceed to open and consider all bids for said work, which is ordered by the Common Council by said Ordinance No. 657, duly enacted as above specified; that the improvement will be let in one contract, and will be required to be completed within thirty (30) days from the date of the awarding of the same to the successful bidder, who will be required to furnish a bond to the City of Hood River in a sum of not less than 25 per cent of the estimated cost of the contract for the faithful performance thereof; that complete specifications are on file in my office covering the improvements for which bids are called, which may be examined by prospective bidders upon application, and said contract will be awarded to the lowest and best bidder upon said specifications.
The City reserves the right to reject any or all bids, or to waive any defects therein, and to open and accept any bid or bids. The terms of the specifications shall be notice to prospective bidders of the requirements demanded by said City in the performance of said work.

CATTLE DISEASE TO INCREASE TOURISTS

W. E. Meacham, president of the Old Oregon Trail association, and Geo. O. Brandenburg, state manager of the Oregon State Motor Association, here last week to call on Chamber of Commerce officials, stated that they believed the foot and mouth disease, prevailing in California, will result in a heavier traffic, than otherwise might be expected, over the trail the coming summer. The stringent quarantine measures and the inconveniences attaching to the enforced disinfection of cars leaving the south, Mr. Meacham said, had already turned the stream of tourist traffic toward the Northwest. The visitors are on the way over the old trail to interest chambers of commerce of towns along the route in a campaign of publicity. Mr. Meacham said he believed the old Oregon trail the coming summer will receive general recognition from motorists on jaunts to the Northwest.
