J. F. Blanchard and sons, Ted and Hal, left Monday for Longview, Wash.

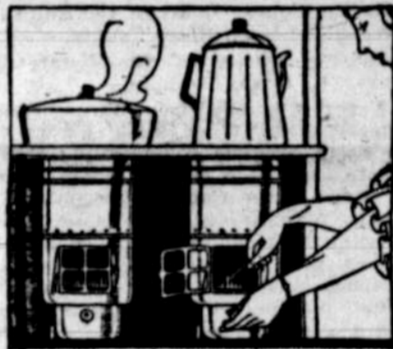
Mrs. L. Shelly left on the early morning train for Portland Monday.
