P. M. Brandt, chief of dairying at Oregon dairy stock in general is able to measure up to the standards, and the cows in the cow-testing asso-ciations show a consistent margin over the requirement of 300 pounds

of fat a year per cow, Many of the best Oregon stock has also been tu-berculin tested and found to be low in percentage of reactors.
Of nearly 50,000 cows tested by the Oregon veterinary department and the federal bureau of animal industry in cooperation with the extension service, fewer than 1½ per cent re-acted. The Calfornia demand is for cows tuberculin tested in herds under state or federal supervision, and for cows in cow testing associations. If not in supervised herds each animal

in the herd must be tuberculin tested and if more than 10 per cent react no animal will be taken from the herd. Owners reporting stock for this sale are asked to give breed, number of animals in each, average price, and other items called for. High grade Holsteins and Guernseys are sought and probably later good Jerseys and Ayrshires. A trainload is wanted at first, and later several more will probably be called for.
