

### LUMBERING IS OREGON'S GREATEST INDUSTRY

In Oregon there are 400 active sawmills, employing 18,000 persons, with an annual payroll of \$12,000,000. Of the 28,000 wage-earners in the state, 64 per cent are engaged in the lumber industry.

The capital invested in the industry in Oregon is \$35,000,000 and the mills are producing each year 2,000,000,000 feet of lumber, valued at about \$30,000,-000. The standing timber of the state, if manufactured into lumber and shipped in carloads of 10,000 feet each, would fill 37,500,000 cars. Coupled together they would make a train 284,000 miles long.

Nearly two-thirds of the persons employed in the state are vitally affected by the industry. A great proportion of the state's business is entirely dependent up-
