Federal Fruit Certification (By W. J. Kocken)

Growers as well as the shippers of fruit who may be negotiating sales should not fail to avail themselves of the protection which federal certifica-The members of the staff of the sale is made subject to federal inis placed on the other party, and the certificate is "prima facie evidence"

A certificate may be secured on any quantity of fruit. For instance, growers who may sell less than carlots to eral inspection and in this way both the grower and buyer are protected In the majority of cases inspections others from out of the state are made at the car door as the fruit cate definitely to a particular lot and excess of last season. > Federal certification work is carried tion with the county fruit inspector's office. This service has now been used by the growers and shippers of the valley for two seasons. Each year the work has more than doubled, but every effort will be made to meet all equests. Persons contemplating the use of this service will greatly assist if they will let the county fruit in-spector know in advance the approx-imate amount of fruit or number of cars on which they will wish federal

> In some fruit districts practically all cars of fruit moved are protected by federal certification. In time it is noped that a like blanket inspection may be worked out for Hood River valley. Some of the growers and shippers this season will have all cars of fruit which they handle federal inspected. Where this service is adopted on all fruit, one uniform inspection system will be established. This avoids making federal inspection an additional inspection to that of the shipper. This duplication of work happened in many instances last season but can be overcome by local organization of the work.
