What is a full-time realth unit? No subject is of greater importance to the service clubs, civic organizations, and others, who are interested in public health activities, than a fulltime health unit. It matters not what activities you may have sponsored or what effort you may have devoted to public health work, your program is incomplete without a full-time health

tain health measures pay. Hookworm disease, malaria and typhoid fever can be eradicated, general and infant mortality rates can be cut in half, com municable diseases can be prevented and the span of life can be increased. obtained, however, it is necessary that the activities of public health administration be placed in the hands of a permanent official or-ganization and executed by a trained personnel. This is represented by a

The full-time health unit is the lat est development in the field of public health administration, and is becoming one of the most popular movements ever undertaken in a public health program. Its objective is to provide and insure for the small rural disservice, such as has been enjoyed here tofore only by the larger cities. It is

generally agreed that this cannot be accomplished by part time health ser-vice. The personnel of a full-time unit varies somewhat with the size and population of the county and the number of communities to be served. It generally consists of a medical officer, one or two public health nurses, one or two sanitary inspectors (where the conditions may demand). and a clerk or office assistant. It has been found by experience that this is the ideal personnel for the average county. All members of the unit should be adequately paid and re-quired to give their full time to the ities of a county are placed on a busi-nesslike basis and results may be ex-

In 1914 there were only three full-time units in the whole of the United States. Today there 250 such units. The state of Oregon has three full-time units. time units in operation and the pros-pects are good for several additional units in the near future. Is your county one of these prospects? If not, why not? The State Board of Health can assist you in getting a full-time unit for your county.
