MRS. C. H. CASTNER PRAISED FOR TALK

Errors Are Cited. Portland, Or., July 24, 1924. Editor Glacier—My attention has been called to two items which appear in the Glacier of the 24th. On page eight, under the heading, "Cherry Growers Bunched," you comment on the extremely low returns received by the Salem growers. You go on to say that it is a thoroughly organized and tight cooperative shipping organization was in existence the growers would take the place of the brokers and speculators who would make the profit that is now made off of them.

For your information we wish to say that Sogel & Day handled over 75 per cent of the cherries shipped by the Salem Cherry Growers Association and netted the growers \$2.24 per box for 15 pound net, unboxed packages; the boxes being very rough and not even paper lined. This means within a very small fraction of a cent of 15 cents per pound.

You have another article, that the association sets a cherry record by having sold a car of Bings and Lamberts for \$4,774.30. Sogel & Day sold a car of Hood River Lamberts in New York at an average price for the entire car, of \$5.75 per box. This car grossed more than \$6,500 and I believe sets the record for Hood River cherries, or in fact any other cherries sold in any market.

Pioneer Dies in South. George Rordan, an old pioneer of Hood River, died Sunday, July 20, at his home in Petaluma, Calif. His body was sent to Mt. Angel for burial.

For 18 years Mr. Rordan was a well known resident of Hood River valley, living west of the Barrett district now which is called the Rordan hills. After leaving Hood River he lived for a time at Mt. Angel, where his wife died. Since that time he has been in the chicken business at Petaluma, California.

Mrs. R. H. Husband went to Petaluma in November to be with her father. Two other children, Mrs. H. J. Kolb and George Rordan, Jr., reside in Petaluma. Three other children survive: Mrs. H. J. Joehimpen and Mrs. F. H. Dornhecker, of Albany, and Fred Rordan, of Silverton.

Mr. Rordan came to America from Germany when he was 14 years of age. He was 70 when he died.

AUTOMOBILES SHOW INCREASE IN STATE

The development of the automobile industry is indicated from a review of the registration figures for the past several years, which shows a total of 63,225 motor vehicle licenses issued within the state of Oregon during the year 1923; 103,790 during the year 1922; and 195,412 during 1921. The total revenues derived from motor vehicle license transactions for the years mentioned were: 1918, \$461,422; 1920, \$2,085,108.50; 1922, \$3,340,519.58; 1923, \$4,068,000.40.

From January 1 to June 30, 1924, the total number of passenger and commercial cars registered is 161,739 as against 153,960 during the same period in 1923 and 26,695 registrations of motor vehicle operators as against 23,314 during that time. The total registration of cars for the first six months of the current year very nearly equals the registration for the entire year of 1923 in which 100,412 cars were licensed. The fees received for all motor vehicle transactions for that year amounted to \$4,068,000.40, whereas for the half-year just closed the receipts total \$4,336,682.54, an increase to date of \$267,682.14 over those of the year 1923.

During the month of June, 1924, the records of the secretary of state show that transactions in connection with the issuing of motor vehicle licenses returned to the treasury total for that month, \$83,378.01 for that month. These fees included the registration of 2,463 passenger cars, 232 trucks, 111 motorcycles, 700 chauffeurs, 2 dealers, 5,255 motor vehicle operators, and 3,475 transfers of motor vehicle licenses and motor vehicle licenses.

The registrations for the month of July will undoubtedly far exceed those of the month just closed, by reason of the fact that in many cases the operation of cars recently acquired has been deferred in order to take advantage of the half fee provided by the law for registrations on and after July 1.

During the month of June 10,624 motor cars from other states were registered in Oregon, an average of 425 cars for each of the days the registration stations were opened.

From every state except Delaware cars entered the state, and in addition there were registrations from Mexico and the Canadian provinces. The greatest number of registrations were cars from California, of which there were 4,286. The state of Washington registration numbered 2,371, and the state of Idaho 568 and Montana 134.

So far during the year 27,405 cars of other states, and countries have entered Oregon and were registered at the registration stations established throughout the state. The Oregon motor vehicle law requires all motor vehicles licensed under the laws of other states when entering Oregon to immediately register their cars. This is for identification purposes and in the operation of the police power of the state; it is also for the protection of the motorists as well.

The registrations indicate that the travel is steadily on the high, with leading into Oregon from the south, as the greater number of registrations are at those stations in the southwestern section of the state along the main highways.

CLIMB MOUNTAIN SOON, SAYS GUIDE

Mark Weygandt, while here Monday urged that all who expect to climb Mount Hood this season should do so immediately.

"I predict an early fall, with much rain on the lower levels, and consequently many storms and much snow on the mountain," said Mr. Weygandt. "When these begin it will stop ascending parties for the season once begins, and it is my prediction that it will begin early, there will be no let up. Furthermore, the climber who expects to climb the mountain should do so as soon as he can. The little snow that is left on the peak is fast disappearing, leaving only bare rocks and ice. The earlier the climber made this year the better it will be."

Guide Weygandt is now contemplating a new trail to the mountain top for the next Legion climb. Instead of climbing over Cooper's Spur he will take his line of climbers up a ridge that lies between Elliot and Coe glaciers. It will be less arduous and less dangerous than the trip up the east side of the mountain, he thinks.

Mr. Weygandt will be at the head of a considerable party that will ascend the mountain from Homestead Inn, leaving at 6 a. m. next Sunday.
