RECORD APPLE SHIPMENTS TO EXPORT

When the big American refrigerated steamer Deerfield leaves Portland the latter part of this week with 110,000 boxes of apples loaded at the Admiral line dock, fresh apple shipments from Portland harbor to Europe this year will have reached an aggregate of approximately 27,570,429 pounds.

This will be less than 4,000,000 pounds under the total shipment of apples from this port to Europe during 1923, with every indication that the record of 31,849,369 pounds shipped last year will be broken before the end of the present month.

Shipments of apples to Europe have already reached a total of 22,480,429 pounds and the Deerfield will take out approximately 5,390,000 pounds.

The steamer Deerfield, which comes to Portland in the service of Chalmers & Carter, docked at the Admiral line dock Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock and started loading Sunday morning. She already had 10,000 boxes of apples, besides other cargo loaded at Seattle, and will complete her cargo at Portland, taking on, besides 110,000 boxes of apples, a large quantity of dried prunes and other merchandise. The steamer will establish a high mark this year for apple shipments on a single carrier.

Another big cargo of apples went out last Thursday for the United Kingdom on the British steamer Royal Star, of the Blue Star line. She loaded at Portland a total of 92,491 boxes of apples amounting to 4,674,559 pounds.

There were assembled at the Admiral line dock approximately 100,000 boxes of apples for shipment. It was announced Saturday. This included the cargo for the Deerfield and also cargo which is being assembled for shipment on the British steamer Gothliester, due in Portland November 20.

In addition to the apples sent to Europe so far this year, Portland has also sent 6,816,200 pounds of apples to Pacific ports of the United States and 290,000 pounds to Atlantic ports.

Infantile Paralysis

(By Frederick P. Stricker, M. D., collaborating epidemiologist, Oregon State Board of Health, in cooperation with United States Public Health Service.)

Poliomyelitis is not unduly prevalent in Oregon at the present time. Reports indicate that it is unusually prevalent in other states. During the past two months there have been 27 cases and four deaths in this state. The Oregon State Board of Health has no desire to create unnecessary alarm concerning the disease but since it is epidemic and because flare-ups of poliomyelitis generally occur at this time of the year, the board issues the following statement:

General Precautions: Keep your children away from crowded and congested public places. Do not let them play with any child or adult who is not entirely well.

Keep your children off the street. Do not allow sick persons who do not belong to your family to enter your home.

Make sure the hands are washed before eating. Rules and regulations for preventing the spread of infantile paralysis: Isolation is a useful measure for limiting the spread of this disease. It is often, however, without demonstrable effect because of the general prevalence of unrecognized cases and carriers.

An isolation period for the patient of not less than two weeks or more than three weeks from onset of the disease unless the temperature has not returned to normal in the meantime.

Children of the same household in contact with the patient must be restricted from places of public assembly for a period of 14 days from last date of contact, as determined by the health officer.

Adults of the household may continue their vocations provided they are not brought into contact with children at any time.

The discharge from the nose, throat and bowels of the patient must be disinfected promptly.

The caretaker shall wash the hands with soap and hot water promptly after handling discharges.

The caretaker shall wash the hands similarly before leaving the room occupied by the patient.

Isolation should be maintained by a thorough washing of the entire body and the hair of the patient. The room should be thoroughly cleaned with soap and hot water and should be aired and sunned.

Sick room precautions should include the usual attention to cleaning and disinfection of eating utensils, personal and bed clothing, rugs, door knobs and other things handled by the patient or caretaker.

Unless special covering and gloves be worn the physician and nurse shall so handle the patient that discharges shall not soil their clothing. Special care being taken to prevent droplet infection. Physician and nurse should thoroughly wash their hands before leaving the premises.

The removal to hospitals of persons affected with poliomyelitis when proper care of patient cannot be obtained at home is advised, but during the earlier stages of the disease patient needs rest in the bed and transportation to a hospital might be detrimental to his welfare.

Query on Road Matters

Parkdale, Or., Nov. 5, 1924. Editor Glacier: May I ask through the columns of your paper if the parties in charge of road work in the Upper Valley have ceased to function? During the present wet spell the link connecting Parkdale with the Loop has gotten in wretched condition, especially the fill over Rodenhelmer creek. Although piles of crushed rock may be seen here and there along the highway no one has attempted to apply it where needed.

Before the completion of the Loop between Mt. Hood and Parkdale the old main county road was the most used, yet practically no work has been done on this stretch for two years. Right now it is really dangerous in view of the reversed curves and narrow roadbed, getting narrower all the while due to brush growing in. Last summer we witnessed the beginning of a system of boulevards in the comparatively unproductive neighborhood formerly logged off by the Oregon Lumber Company at the same time the old Mt. Hood-Parkdale road was being entirely neglected. Again there are stumps and culverts along this road that are positively dangerous and may at any time involve the county in a heavy lawsuit.

Is it not true that from an engineering point of view the most money should be spent where the heaviest traffic is involved? The answer to this question is that technically it's indisputable but not always politically expedient.

Apple Shipments 2,500 Cars

By the end of this week the total apple shipments from here will have exceeded the 2,500 mark. Records of shippers Saturday showed that 2,290 cars had been routed. The average daily shipments now reach 50 cars. Apples will continue to roll at this rate until near Thanksgiving, when it is anticipated shipping will slack off until after the holidays. The Mt. Hood R. R. Co. is now handling an average of 35 cars per day.

Total shipments of canning apples from here this season up to Saturday had reached 219 cars, and the pear tonnage was 122 cars.

The county gives \$1,500 toward the maintenance of the county nurse fund and the local chapter of the Red Cross finances the balance. The total annual expense is around \$3,000.

ENGLAND THREATENS TARIFF ON APPLES

Latest advices from London are to the effect that in all probability the new Conservative government will take steps to bring into effect protective measures on fruit, including other produce of the overseas dominions.

It will be recalled that when Premier Baldwin and his Conservative government went down to defeat a year ago that the chief issue was preference for colonial products. On that platform the Tory government suffered reverses. At that time it was proposed that a levy of five shillings per cwt. be exacted from all apples, other than British, entering the United Kingdom. Similar levies on other things were also under consideration.

It is this five shillings preference on apples that it is reported will become effective shortly after the new government gets settled in the saddle. Should this proposal become law it will mean that all Canadian and other British Colonial apples, will enter the United Kingdom free of all duty at present, but all foreign apples, which of course means American apples, will be called upon to pay five shillings a cwt., which roughly speaking, would work out at about 60 cents per box.

Only the briefest advices have been received by cable and further particulars are being awaited with interest.

Noontime Rainbows Thrill

Local folk the first of the week were thrilled by the magnificence of noontime rainbows. While a heavy drizzle of rain prevailed the sun came forth about 12 and the reflected light forming a perfect arch up and down the Columbia river, the top of the bow directly over the canyon of the White Salmon river.

The "rainbow ends" rested in the blue waters of the river, while the west ends scintillated on the brown surface of a huge sandbar. The background of the lower portion of the arches were formed by cascaded rock or fir clad sides of the greater canyon. Snow touched hills formed a background for the whole.
