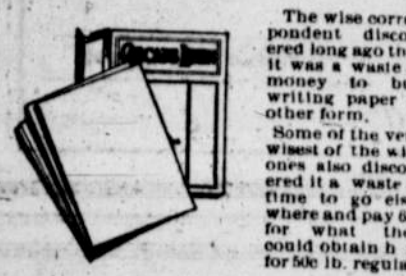

SCHEDULE OF TOLLS ON BRIDGE GIVEN

Recently, when E. M. Chandler of the Oregon-Washington Bridge Company, was here he informed Harry Conaway, who will be superintendent of the structure, that the span will be ready for traffic about November 20. The following is the schedule of tolls on the bridge, each rate being for a one-way trip.

- A. Rates for Individuals: 1. Pedestrians, each one person (see note following No. 6), \$10. 2. One person on bicycle, including bicycle (see note following No. 6), \$20. 3. Two persons on bicycle, including bicycle (see note following No. 6), \$30. 4. Each person riding upon an animal (including animal), (see note following No. 6), \$20. 5. Each person (except driver) riding upon a vehicle not operated on a schedule approved by the owner of franchise, (see note following No. 6), \$10. 6. Each person (except driver) riding upon a vehicle operated on a schedule approved by the owner of franchise, (see note following No. 6), \$08.

- Note: Children seven years of age and over, full fare; under seven years of age, free. B. Live Stock and Animals: 1. One animal driven led or ridden of cattle, goats, hogs, mules or sheep, including one person, \$20. 2. For drove of animals including cattle, goats, hogs, horses, mules and sheep on foot, ten head and under, each \$10. 3. For each head of such animals over ten head, in one lot, \$04. C. Self Propelled Vehicles (Including Drivers): 1. Motorcycles, \$50. 2. Passenger vehicles having seats for two persons, \$75. 3. Passenger vehicles having seats for more than two but not more than eight persons, \$75. 4. Passenger vehicles and cars having seats for more than eight persons, \$75. 5. Trucks not over one ton capacity, \$75. 6. Trucks over one ton but not over two ton capacity, \$150. 7. Trucks over two ton but not over four ton capacity, \$200. 8. Trucks over four ton capacity, \$500. 9. Self propelled vehicles moving under their own power not otherwise specified including frame engines, tractors, and road rollers, \$500. 10. Trailers drawn by self propelled vehicles, each trailer, \$50.

Note: The rates from C1 to C10 inclusive are exclusive of passengers other than operator. D. Vehicles Drawn by Animals: 1. One vehicle drawn by one animal, \$75. 2. One vehicle drawn by two animals, \$75. 3. One vehicle drawn by three animals, \$100. 4. One vehicle drawn by four animals, \$150. 5. One vehicle drawn by six animals, \$150. 6. Each vehicle additional in tow, \$50. 7. Each additional animal, \$50. Note: The rates from D1 to D7 inclusive are exclusive of passengers.

It is the intention of Hood River county to construct a road connecting the Columbia River highway with the south approach of the bridge owned by the Oregon-Washington Bridge Company; such road to be a part of a new highway system, adequate to care for all traffic, and free from interruptions by normal high water. Whenever such road shall be constructed, the public shall be entitled to make free use of such portion of the Oregon approach as may be necessary to reach a wharf to be owned and operated by the public; provided that such free use is made in such a manner as not to interfere with traffic across the bridge, and that such approach is not to be used by the public in connection with the operation of any commercial ferry between Hood River, White Salmon and Underwood.

CITY PROPOSES A PLAN FOR PAVING

The city of Hood River has appealed to the state highway commission for aid in paving an approximate 1,100-foot stretch of Cascade avenue at the west end of town, according to advice given the county court and members of the advisory budget committee, which met with the court last Thursday. The city for the past year has sought ways and means of paving the street. The property abutting on the thoroughfare, however, will be unable to stand the assessments. The city council had advised the county court that the highway commission will be willing to reimburse the county, by appropriating funds for county road work, if the county will apply its funds to the paving of the city street. Under an existing statute the highway commission will be unable to participate directly in paying for paving in the city limits. It is estimated that the paving will cost an approximate \$5,000.

(Miriam Grow) Because of the courtesy extended to Professor H. G. Keeney in the use of the science laboratory during the last vacation he has presented to the Hood River high school a set of 25 microscopic slides showing the native woods in cross, vertical and longitudinal sections. After the high school assembly little pamphlets were distributed to the teachers and the pupils, giving the history of our Flag from 1775 to date, illustrated in colors. These pamphlets were secured by Superin-

tendent Cannon from The American Security Association and were distributed through the courtesy of the Butler Banking Company and the First National Bank, of Hood River, who paid for the printing and transportation. At the junior high school the principal speaker was Dr. James Fraser.
