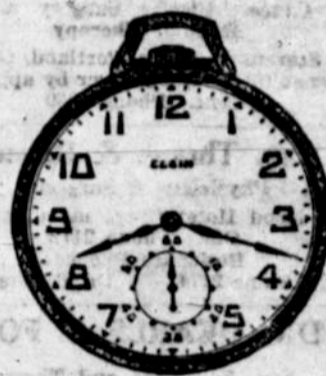

POOLEY'S LOSS IN APPLE FIRE \$35,000

The most disastrous fruit fire ever to occur in the Hood River valley was that last Friday afternoon when the Pine Grove packing plant of E. R. Pooley was burned to the ground, destroying an approximate 15,000 boxes of apples and entailing a loss estimated at \$35,000. The packing plant was one of the largest and best equipped in the mid-Columbia. The lower floor was given over to storage space and packing and grading machinery. The second story was equipped as sleeping quarters for members of his harvest crew, and it was here that the fire, from some undetermined source, started. Mr. Pooley, who was handling his own record yield of fruit this year, was also representing Page & Son, Portland dealers. He had the brightest prospects for years for a fine return from his orchard.

A motor pumper of the city fire department responded to a call for help, but the flames had made such headway that little could be done on its arrival. The pumper aided in saving an adjoining toolhouse.

Mr. Pooley had his warehouse and apple crop covered by insurance, and yet his loss will be severe.

Mrs. Olaf Sholin was buried here Wednesday, having passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Esther Morris, in White Salmon very suddenly last Monday.

The Sholin family made their home in Stevenson for many years, moving from here about four years ago. Mr. Sholin and the elder son are now in Alaska.

Scott Hughes says it's a fact that trouble never comes but what it comes in bunches. Wednesday Scott was splitting wood with a single bit ax when the handle caught and the ax cut a big gash on his head.

Yesterday while he was helping cut wood his right hand got under the saw and nearly severed the hand. Dr. Barber thinks he will be able to save all the fingers and the hand will heal without much injury.

In the death of Emil Willard there has passed one of the oldest settlers and most respected citizens of Skamania county, he having been county commissioner for six years, from 1909 to 1915. The death of Mr. Willard occurred at the White Salmon hospital November 22. Blood poison several years ago left him in a physical condition from which he never entirely recovered and which hastened his death. The funeral was held November 24 at the White Salmon Methodist Episcopal church. Rev. J. C. Lawrence, the pastor of the Stevenson Methodist church, officiating, assisted by Rev. Young of the first named church. Burial was in Underwood cemetery.

Howard Peeler Here from Canada. Howard Peeler, who was a pioneer orchardist here and whose home is now at Beynon, Alta., says that the ranchers of that neighborhood are fairly prosperous this year. The drought, however, caused a heavy damage. In some places growers had their crop entirely ruined. In other localities the harvest reached 50 bushels to the acre, Mr. Peeler reported.

"The harvest was still in progress when I left," said Mr. Peeler, "although snow had fallen. Up to last week we had to haul the threshed grain out on sleds. It turned warm, and for a week before I left we were using wagons. Our temperature the past week ranged from 30 degrees in the morning to 50 at nighttime."

"We had the best labor situation, from the farmers' standpoint, we have had in years. Formerly we had to go to the towns in search of help. This year it came to us. We paid \$6 per day last year for threshing help. This year we got it for \$4."
