

**LAW ENFORCEMENT  
COSTS COUNTY \$435**

According to the prohibition investigator's report for Hood River county, total expenses of dry law enforcement here the past year reached \$4913, while the total receipts were only \$4,477.67, leaving a deficit of \$435.33. In detail the expenses and receipts were as follows:

W. Riley, salary and car hire paid from general fund, 1924, \$2400; G. Sloat, salary and car hire paid from general fund, nine months, \$900; G. Sloat, booze cop, paid by district attorney from liquor fund, \$900; J. C. Davis, special, \$250; miscellaneous expenses by district attorney from liquor fund, \$403; total expenses, not including additional court or jail expense, \$4913.

Receipts—Liquor fines collected, 1924, \$2,905; confiscated cars sold, \$541.67; fines for violation of motor laws, \$1,731; total receipts, \$4,477.67.

Loss to county, besides court and jail costs, \$435.33.

State prohibition officers did not operate in the county during the year. Twenty-three dollars were remitted to the state as a result of arrests made by state traffic men.

**Many Willing to be Companion**

The day before Christmas an apple buyer at London, Eng., announced that he had found a note in a box of Newtown apples which carried an appeal from a Hood River fruit grower for a life companion. Scotch and English newspapers gave the story wide circulation, and as a result, since the Apple Growers Association label appeared on the box, the local cooperative association has been receiving numerous replies from women of the British Isles who are willing to become the orchardist's companion.

General Manager Steele is holding the letters, which, he states, he is ready to turn over to "Apple Grower who wants a life companion."

A 100-pound of sulfur application to an acre of several types of Oregon land every three to four years should give a ton or more increase in yield of legume hay on most of the alfalfa lands, says the state experiment station. Subsequent applications are lighter particularly on humid soils. Apply early and harrow in when the meadows are renovated, is the station recommendation.

**EDUCATIONAL TREND  
REGRETTED BY BALE**

The trend of the modern educational system was decried Sunday night by Fred G. Bale, former attorney who is now teacher of public speaking at Albany College. Mr. Bale declared that the American method of teaching the young is proving deficient for the reason that an effort is being made to fit the child to a system instead of fitting the system to the needs of various types of children.

"Instead of studying the temperament of individual children," said Mr. Bale, "we are grouping all children in single large classes and driving them mill-willy through the same bottle neck of education. This system results in a great deal of deficiently educated men and women."

**Electric Orchard Heater Invented**

An electric system for heating fruit orchards, which the inventor claims will save fruit growers on the Pacific coast millions of dollars annually and which is the invention of H. J. Baude, Napa county, Pennsylvania, farm advisor, has been endorsed by M. S. Henoch, chief heating engineer of the Westinghouse Electrical Co., of Pittsburgh, and by J. Wren, consulting engineer of the Great Western Power Co. According to the inventor the electric system is self controlled. A thermostat, which may be placed under each tree, manipulates the electric control heaters. This will do away with the smudge pot system when the process is perfected.
