RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION TO THE FORE

At a recent meeting of the Ministerial Association it was decided to call a meeting of all the pastors and Sunday school superintendents of the city to consider the matter of a week day school of religion. This meeting was held at the St. Mark's parish house and resulted in the formation of a local council of religious education.

The public probably knows that week day classes in religion are being conducted in many cities in cooperation with the public schools. The directors of the public schools are, under the law, allowed to displace pupils from school for one period a week to receive instruction in religion or concerning the Bible, provided a certificated teacher has charge of the class or classes, and provided proper meeting places are furnished by the churches. It was decided to ascertain from the parents of the pupils in Park Street school how many of them would be interested in having their children avail themselves of this opportunity. With this idea in mind Rev. Lindsey H. Miller, who is chairman of the local council of religious education, appointed I. R. Acheson, Rev. W. O. Livingstone and F. A. Olmsted as a committee to inform the parents what is proposed and find out their wishes in the matter. If there is sufficient interest, the school board will be asked to cooperate in the working out of a plan.

The spirit of cooperation shown in the meeting was very gratifying. The majority of the local churches were represented by both ministers and laymen.
