### H. R. BOX CO. IS OFFERING ITS STOCK

The Hood River Box Co., managed here the past several years by H. A. Bell, has begun a campaign to market \$50,000 of stock, to be issued in shares of \$10 each, to businessmen and orchardists of the valley. It is proposed to make the expanded box manufacturing enterprise a cooperative concern.

Subscriptions to the new stock issue, it is stated, will not be binding

unless at least \$22,500 is subscribed. Through the increase of capital and the utilization of a local timber supply, the box manufacturers declare that they hope to manufacture a large percentage of the 2,000,000 containers for apples needed annually by growers here.

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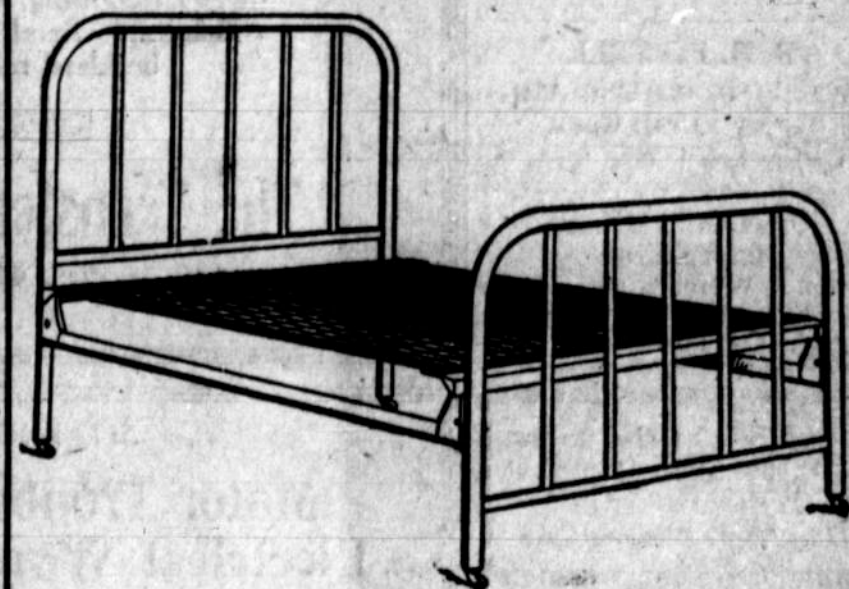
