WHITE SALMON

Mr. and Mrs. A. Mearns and son, Bobby, who is always ready with the question, "Daddy, gimme a nick-cull?" motored to Portland via Hood River Saturday.

The White Salmon Guild will hold a thimble bee Wednesday. Their motto is "Darn! Darn! Darn!" These ladies furnish a great deal of comfort to the needy and afflicted here.

Fishermen and others, bent on recreative likes and auto rides, should beware of crossing Buck creek bridge until repairs to the structure have been made. High water has rendered it unsafe.

The Commercial club held its annual meeting at the school house Monday of last week.

The White Salmon Women's club sponsored a big dance and card party given Friday evening to raise funds for the beautification of the grounds of Columbia union hi. The result was gratifying. The inclemency of the weather failed to keep enthusiastic boosters away.

Henry Pearson, Trout Lake booster, waded in to town Wednesday. He reports bright prospects ahead for the establishment of a good road to White Salmon during the coming summer. Road work will be started as soon as possible.

A trip up the flooded area in Jewett canyon Saturday disclosed many interesting things. Big pumpkins, perhaps Japanese squashes (I do not know) were found within a few feet of the North Bank Highway. Debris is piled high at this point. Huge boulders were washed down from the Jewett place and permanently lodged in the little creek of years past. New channels have been formed and the irrigation system on Isubota's fine garden tract was utterly ruined. His loss will probably reach the sum of \$1500.

The flood waters covered the front porch on a shack where one of his employes was housed. As we clambered up the treacherous and slippery rocks to the Jewett farm other interesting things were seen. Indeed, wealed; some very pathetic, indeed. Broken orchard equipment, dead animals, broken fruit containers stamped with North White Salmon growers' names. These had washed down from the hills, three miles away. Jewett creek is still running high, and a short trip up the canyon from the Jewett bridge is well worth the effort. To those who are more adventurous a run up to the hunch-seat district from the Bullard place to "Tavesentha," Herbert Williams' place, will disclose something more interesting and pathetic. Williams lost about 300 bearing Delicious apples when his dam went out. Upon receipt of the bad news by wire he immediately started west from Minneapolis, and he is now too busy to be interviewed by the Glacier reporter.

Wade Dean, manager of the Mt. Adams orchards, a famous throughout the world, was a White Salmon visitor during the middle of the week.

A hike from Bingen up the Burdoin mountain road Friday disclosed a queer contrast, considering the short distance (three miles). Wild flowers in Bingen district and two inches of snow on the summit of the mountain. This is melting rapidly and the green grass is again peeping out.

Mrs. W. D. Mapes, of Burdoin mountain, has sufficiently recovered from her recent illness to be removed to her home, where she is being cared for by Mrs. Albins, of Vancouver.

The Legion boys have planned something rich in the way of unusual entertainment for guests at their annual masque ball to be held the evening of February 21. Legion hall is large and the decorations will be unique. Prizes will be given for the best characters portrayed. Hood River Valley guests will receive royal welcome and there will be a rip-roaring time for everyone attending the party.

White Salmon society regrets the departure of Mr. and Mrs. P. G. Ripper, who will establish residence at McMinnville, where Mr. Ripper represents General Petroleum. His associates in the new venture are Messrs. Van Allen and McCarthy, popular operators of the Hood River-White Salmon ferry service. Now Commodore! just so what you have gone and done. We cannot afford to lose two such men as these ex-ferry skippers from our respective districts.

F. C. Savidge, wealthy Portland resident, who is the proud owner of a fine orchard, proposition on slightly Burdoin mountain (don't smile) did not dispose of his 1924 on a consignment basis, but realized \$2 per box for his entire crop, acting as his own salesman. The crop was moved down the steep grade of the scenic, narrow, winding mountain road without mishap. Six trips per day were made by the expert driver.

Burdoin mountain and Snowden people are jubilant over the prospective road from Laws corner to Vila, on the S. P. & railway, connecting with the North Bank Highway. More than half of the new road has been completed from the old Slack ranch east to Atwood's place and Vila. This will add another outlet to the river, which is a very short distance from Hessler's corner on the Snowden highway.

Herman Creek Plant Enlarged
A crew of men last week began work on Herman creek, just east of Cascade Locks, constructing a new unit for the Skmanian Light & Power Co., the system of which lights Cascade Locks and Stevenson, Wash. A 400-horse power dynamo will be installed in the new unit, more than doubling the capacity of the system according to Manager Samson.

The power concern has a valuable power site on Wind river, and this, it was stated, will be developed later as the demand for more energy materializes in the Cascades region.

CONCERNING CARE OF NURSERY STOCK

(By W. J. Kocken, County Fruit Inspector).

The indications are for fairly heavy planting of fruit trees in the Hood River valley this spring. The handling which these trees receive from the nursery row to the place of a permanent setting is a big factor in its future growth.

Needless to say, at no time should the roots of the trees be allowed to become dry. If they are not in a moist condition upon receipt of shipment, they may be freshened by submerging the entire tree in water for a short time before heeling into the ground. Regardless of the length of time the trees may be held before planting, they should be properly heeled into the ground. It was noted in many instances that this was not done last spring. The following method is suggested: The following method:

A trench 18 to 20 inches deep is dug running east and west. If a large number of trees is to be heeled in, this trench may be started by plowing a deep furrow. The south side of the trench is given a gentle slope while the north side should be as perpendicular as possible. The trees are then spread out singly along this trench with the tops pointing toward the south. The loose dirt is then placed on them so that about half the tops as well as the root system are well covered. The reason for placing the tops toward the south is that a minimum amount of sunlight will strike them and this helps to prevent excessive drying out and also retards their starting growth.

In many instances last season, it was noted that nursery stock was heeled in the ground without breaking the bundles and in some cases they were placed in an upright position. This method permits the air to reach the center tree and as no dirt is in contact with the roots, they will soon dry out.

The bunch method of heeling should be discouraged, and trees so heeled in should be examined very carefully before planting.

When planting, it is a good plan to place a barrel about one-half full of water on a stone float or other low drag. Enough heavy clay is added to make a thin paste. The trees are then placed in this barrel and transported to the field. As the trees are extracted they are immediately placed in the ground by the planting crew and not scattered out along the row ahead of the men. This prevents any chances of drying out, which quite often happens when a large number of trees are pulled and the wind allowed to hit the roots.
