THE DE RESZKE SINGERS NEXT THURSDAY

The De Reszke singers, four young Americans, all pupils of the famous Polish tenor and teacher, Jean de Reszke, are being enthusiastically received wherever they appear on their present concert tour of the United States. The quartet includes Hardesty Johnson, Floyd Townsley, Erwyn Mutch and Sigurd Nelson. They will appear in Portland in concert Thursday night, February 23, at the Public Auditorium, under direction of Steers & Coman. Mr. Mutch is of Portland and will be greeted by many friends. Mr. Nelson is of Hood River.

At their first concert in New York the De Reszke singers won the applause and recognition of both public and press. They were assisted by Miss Mildred Dilling, harpist, who accompanies them on their country-wide tour.

According to the critic of the New York Herald: "This male quartet is a strong-voiced, thoroughly unified ensemble, and gave a performance that was both artistic and with pleasing, well balanced quality of tone and marked expressive ability. Miss Dilling, a skillful harpist, played two groups of solos."

Other New York critics also accorded the De Reszke singers high praise. "The singers gave evidence in their delivery of the fine training of Jean de Reszke. Their voices had much color and they sang with fine nuance, clear diction and spirit."—New York Sun.

"The voices taken singly are good. Grouped together they command a great variety of tone color, while effectively blending together."—New York Times.

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CITY IS FOSTERING CLEAN-UP PLANS

The city council Monday night entered resolutely into a clean-up campaign, and Fire Marshal Morgan was instructed to begin immediately to urge owners of vacant lots that have become littered with old automobile tires and other rubbish to remove the trash. The county health association and the Chamber of Commerce are backing the clean-up and paint-up campaign, and plans call for a city immaculate before May 1 when apple orchards will be in bloom.

Morgan will also conduct a campaign for the elimination of fire hazards while aiding in securing a clean city. Basements of business blocks will be inspected and owners compelled to remove all combustible litter.

Mindego, a Filipino servant, was declared to have been found in a compromising position with a prominent young white girl, aged 13. The Filipino was arrested by a citizen's posse to The Dalles. Threats of lynching were made before the man was removed to the county seat town.

COUNTY HERD LAW IS NOW EFFECTIVE

District Attorney John Baker has issued a warning to ranchers to keep their livestock confined, citing that a herd law, prohibiting the running at large of stock in the county, except in the Mount Hood national forest, had been adopted by the legislature and approved by the governor with an emergency clause attached. The measure carries penalties of \$10 to \$50 in fines and 10 to 30 days jail sentence.

A section of the bill, introduced by Representative Hazlett, is as follows: "If any domestic animal, or animal, or livestock shall go upon the land of any person, other than the owner or person in possession or control of such animal, animals or livestock, the same shall constitute a trespass whether said lands be enclosed with a fence or not, and the owner or possessor of such lands shall be entitled to recover for damages done thereby in the usual manner for collecting damages for trespass, together with his costs and a reasonable attorney's fee, which remedy shall be in addition to the criminal penalty provided in this act."

News of the Golfers
The golf club has just finished placing \$5,000 worth of treasury certificates with members. When the golf course was constructed a deficit of \$5,000 was incurred because of unforeseen expenses. Because of the deficit the club has been operating under a handicap.

The fairways and greens of the golf course are both covered with an irrigation system, and the entire links are now in fine shape. J. Williams, new grounds keeper, is busy daily with a crew dressing down the turfs. The members of the club declare that the Hood River course will be one of the most alluring in the northwest the coming summer.

H. R. CREAMERY NOTES
The directors of the Mt. Angel Creamery paid a visit to Hood River last week to inspect the plant of the Hood River Creamery. The visitors declared that they had found no where in Oregon a more modern butter and ice cream making plant than here. The local folk were congratulated, too, on the excellent management of their cooperative institution.
