STAGE AND SCREEN

Two Divorces Granted

Two wives, Mrs. Gladys B. Hughes, who alleged desertion by her husband, O. C. Hughes, formerly local meat market man, and Mrs. Augusta Trill, teacher and cashier, have been awarded divorce decrees by Circuit Judge Wilson. Both plaintiffs were given the custody of minor children. Mrs. Trill charged her husband, W. O. Trill, an attorney now located at Harrisburg, with cruelty, declaring that he made false charges as to her conduct and during the recent Christmas holidays maltreated her.

Mrs. Hughes, who has four minor children, was given \$50 a month alimony. Mrs. Trill, with two small children, was given \$25 per month. The husbands under the decree must also provide clothing for the children. Neither defendant appeared in defense of the action against him.
