STEVENSON

(From Skamania County Pioneer)
The Bank of Stevenson has dropped its heavy clothes and now emerges as a full grown institution in the financial world.

V. H. Lindsay fell from the scaffolding on the new theatre building Friday morning and dislocated his right shoulder and received a slight cut on his head.

The rains of the past month have caused the Columbia river to rise so rapidly that E. M. Mann lost about 10 cords of wood he had on the beach east of town ready to load on a scow for delivery to Stevenson. Rivermen also report that a good many logs have been seen on their way to the sea.

The county commissioners have an eye for beauty and also a desire to protect the public health, as at the last meeting they ordered President Attorney Sly and Sheriff Gordon to take all means possible to prohibit dumping of refuse and trash along the county and state highways. Many reports have been made that people are dumping rubbish along the highways and in some instances the same had to be removed at the expense of the public. The cooperation of the public is asked in keeping the roadways as attractive as possible.

State Highway No. 8, known as the North Bank Highway, is to receive \$1,020,000 during the next biennium for improvement and new construction. Through the efforts of Senator Christensen and Representative Shipley, assisted by the Clarke county delegation, the bill authorizing this expenditure was made.

An appropriation of \$820,000 is announced for new construction and improvement from Vancouver to Maryhill, \$290,000 from Maryhill to Bumble, \$500,000 from Skamania county line to Prindle by way of Cape Horn. This includes a large amount of new work and is the heaviest construction on the North Bank highway. It will shorten the route by about seven miles and eliminate several sharp and dangerous turns, which have been the scene of several accidents in the past.

APPLE MARKETERS PLAN FEDERATION

Preliminary steps for the formation of a federation of the apple growers' cooperative marketing organizations of the Pacific northwest were taken at a meeting at the Portland Chamber of Commerce Saturday, attended by members of the northwest apple growers' commission, apple growers of Hood River, Wenatchee and the Walla Walla districts and representatives of the Portland Chamber of Commerce and of Oregon Agricultural College.

A plan for such a central organization was drawn up, providing for the inclusion of the cooperatives of Hood River, Wenatchee and the inland empire, with headquarters at Walla Walla and Dayton, Wash.

According to this scheme, which will be submitted to the different cooperative organizations for their approval immediately, each association would continue to maintain its individual sales manager. They would cooperate, however, in the purchase of supplies, and have uniform sales contracts. The central organization, it was declared, would have as its principal function the lessening of the cost of marketing and the improving of conditions of distribution. Each association would pay into the central not to exceed 1/2 cent a box on the 1925 crop.

It was declared that after the central organization had begun functioning in good shape an effort would be made to obtain the membership of all cooperative apple associations.

The plan for the formation of such a central federation of apple growers' cooperative organizations has been under consideration for some time. The apple growers' commission was appointed about a year ago by the state chamber of commerce of Washington to consider the formation of

such a federation. Members of this commission were present at Saturday's meeting: C. K. Benton, of Hood River; E. M. Gillette, of Wenatchee, and J. L. Dunsmuir, of Dayton, Wash., took a leading part in the working out of the final plan adopted. R. H. Klipp, of the marketing department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, and C. J. Hurd, of the agricultural college, cooperated in the actual drawing up of the plan. A. F. S. Steele and R. J. McIsaac attended the Portland meeting Saturday.

The association board of directors will pass on plans of the proposed federation of cooperative apple sales agencies today. If the board recommends the affiliation of the local cooperative matter will be referred to the organization's membership at a later date.

Mrs. Rand Allowed \$85 per Month
County Judge Hasbrouck has allowed Mrs. Hester Rand, widow of the late Robert Rand, who recently died at the age of 90 years, the sum of \$85 per month as living expenses, the sum to be paid monthly in advance until the executors of Mr. Rand's will, his son, Ernest C. Rand, and son-in-law, Axel N. Rahm, of Metzger, furnish an inventory of the property.

In his will executed in 1922, Mr. Rand left his widow \$200 in cash and the interest on \$1,000 in bonds, the will stating that the latter was in lieu of her dower estate in realty. The will leaves Mrs. Rand \$1,000, the sum of \$500 to a son, D. E. Rand, and all real estate and the residue of personal property to Ernest C. Rand.

Mrs. Rand in her appeal to the court asked the possession of the home just west of the city, which was granted, and \$100 per month. She expressed the belief that the personal property of Mr. Rand would reach a value of \$30,000. In answer to the petition the executors declared that the personal property will not exceed \$5,500. The answer contended that \$40 per month would be a sufficient monthly allowance for the widow, a second wife, who was married to Mr. Rand in 1907.

Band Minstrels Please

The Hood River Knights of Pythias band and its minstrel show repeated previous triumphs in The Dalles last night before an audience that came near to filling the civic auditorium to capacity.

The program was a combination affair, consisting of a motion picture and the minstrel show, with the band taking a prominent part in the latter. The band selections were exceptionally well rendered.

The minstrel show proper was well rounded out, with the work of the two end men, Thornton and Isenberg, particularly noticeable. Selections by the official American Legion quartet for Oregon, included in the personnel of the minstrel show, drew repeated applause.

Beck Improves Service Station
Indications of an early spring have spurred service station operators and those who expect to enter to motor tourists to activity here. M. L. Beck has remodeled the old brick building on Cascade avenue formerly known as the Cascade Garage. He will operate a tire shop. He has subleased a part of the building to a mechanic and a battery man will be employed.

Mr. Beck will move to the new quarters from a smaller structure next door. The latter place will be occupied by C. A. Cass, who will

operate a lunch counter and sell fruits of the valley in season.

Franklin Home Looted
Sheriff Edick's office has been notified of the wholesale theft of rugs and household furniture from the Franklin residence of W. A. Mack, who with his family is wintering in Portland. Property estimated at \$400

was stolen. An automobile, equipped with balloon tires, as was noted in the track leading to the home, was apparently used in removing the loot.

Neighbors believe the theft was committed by someone familiar with the premises, as the car was piloted over a culvert that would have been demolished except by someone who knew of its defects.

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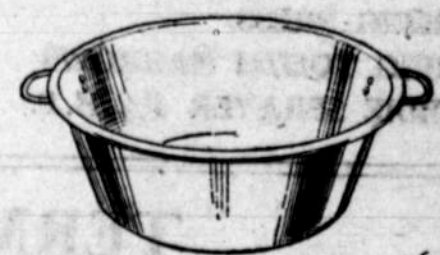
