**COURT ANNOUNCES**

**1925 ROAD PROJECTS**

Highway projects of Hood River county, including maintenance and new construction, as outlined by the county court, will cost an approximate \$80,000 for 1925. The major project for the season's road program will be an approximate three miles of market road, to be constructed from Winans station on the Mt. Hood R. R. company's line north on the river road to a point where it intersects with the Odell road. The grade will be cut to conform with state specifications and a surfacing of crushed rock will be applied. The new work will cost about \$23,000.

A new bridge and approach will be constructed on the Lost Lake highway. The cost is estimated at \$6,000. Bids have been called for, and it is anticipated that the work will be completed in time to take care of the heavy traffic of recreationists.

The road from Dee south to Parkdale will be surfaced with crushed rock at a cost of about \$2,000. Work on the Odell lateral to the Mount Hood Loop highway will cost about \$3,000. The court has secured a right of way through the place of John Marks. The road will be graded and rocked. A new grade, a part of the cost of construction being borne by Mr. Kobez, is being constructed to connect the Twentieth Century Truck Farm of John Kobez with the Columbia River highway. The new road will cost the county about \$10,000. The sum of \$800 will be applied to a new road connecting Camp One with Boneboro in the Upper Valley. Ranchers have cooperated by doing the clearing.

As soon as Summit residents have agreed on a location, work will start on the Kollas road.
