STAGE AND SCREEN

"A good pipe, a good trout fishing outfit or a good gun, a dog or a horse for company, and the freedom of the big woods. That's the life worth while."

This sentiment is voiced by House Peters, film star, who plays the title role in "The Tornado," Universal Jewel production to be shown at the Rialto theatre Friday and Saturday.

"The so-called 'wide open spaces' of the great western plains have never held the appeal for me that have the timbered hills and the lakes and streams in the mountain country," he said.

"To me trout fishing along a mountain stream is the king of sports, although I love big game hunting well. Without either of these sports, however, the woods would be worth while. I have sat for hours on the slope of a hill just watching the white summer clouds float across the fields of blue in the sky between the pines."

"There's a lot of beauty in an old pine tree and there's a comfort to the loneliness of the hills that is found in no city of the world. I can think of nothing so tragic as a forest fire. It voices the destruction not only of resources of incalculable value, but the destruction of a playground that amounts almost to a world's ideal."

Screen version of the famous Lincoln J. Carter stage melodrama of the same name "The Tornado," comes heralded as one of the most spectacularly thrilling pictures ever made.

Most of the scenes were filmed in the heavily timbered regions of Idaho, along the St. Joe river and its tributaries. Lumberjacks were used as so-called extras, but, in this case, except for the lumberjacks, they were active principals for much of the action, which shows big trees crashing to earth as the result of the combined attack of the woodsmen's axe and saw.

Old folks, the middle aged, youth and the children, all will welcome the news that Mary Pickford is coming back to Hood River. She will be seen at the Rialto theatre, Sunday, Monday and Tuesday in "Dorothy Vernon of Haddon Hall."

Talking of the play the great sweetheart of the movies says: "Dorothy Vernon of Haddon Hall" isn't a costume picture in the ordinary movie sense of the word; it isn't a 'million dollar' production with the story all buried in a clutter of clothes and scenery," Miss Pickford asserts.

"I have tried to make of Charles Major's celebrated romantic novel such an interesting and real life-like human story that the spectator will see the costumes only as a natural and necessary incident of the background. It is true that we garbed 'Dorothy Vernon' elaborately, and that the settings are different to a high degree; nevertheless, they are not overdrawn—never anything but secondary to the prime importance of the story."

"I want 'Dorothy Vernon' to make every man's wife remember the time when her husband told her she was the only woman in the world, and make him hold her hand while telling her again. I hope it will, and I believe it will. That's how strongly the story—the romance—dominates the costumes, which are typical of the period, but always secondary."

The exquisite lines of the Elizabethan period costume—sixteenth century, England—when voluminous skirts and beaded, beaded and beaded decorations were all the vogue, present a most beautiful Mary Pickford than the myriad admirers of even "the world's sweetheart" have been accustomed to seeing.

In the big banquet scene Miss Pickford's admirers see her in a gorgeous gown of black and gold brocade, with metal lace sleeves studded with pearls, and underskirt showing among the fringes of gold metal cloth adorned with patterns of roses embroidered in pearls. On the sleeves are a hundred gross of seed pearls. Five women worked two weeks to string the pearls that decorate these sleeves. Even more charming and stunning than the banquet costume is Miss Pickford in the Dorothy Vernon bridal gown, designed from a view of an old English print. This is of sage green velvet, lined with orchid taffeta, with underskirt of green and silver brocade embroidered in emeralds and pearls.

WYETH MAY GET INTO TWO UNION DISTRICTS

According to local legal opinion the citizens of the Wyeth school district, who have filed with the county school high school district and another for

inclusion in a new union high school district, which proposes a union high school at Cascade Locks, may and themselves voted into both districts.

The law governing the formation of union high school districts, it is cited, provides that such a district shall be formed if a majority of all electors in all petition districts as well as a majority of the districts themselves vote favorably to such union. It is said that the vote may easily be such that the Wyeth section may legally be included in both districts.

County School Superintendent Crites, when the Hood River district was proposed, stated that he visited Wyeth, and found the sentiment overwhelmingly in favor of the Hood River or union district.

"I felt that it was only fair to ascertain the sentiment of the Wyeth people before including them in the districts that have petitioned for the Hood River union district and who will soon vote on the proposition," Mr. Crites stated.

Later, however, Cascade Locks in-

cluded plans for a union high school district, including Wyeth, Cascade Locks and a small portion of the eastern border of Multnomah county, and sufficient petitioners from the Wyeth district were secured to include that district in the Cascade district. Dates have been set for both elections.
