It was gratifying to the directors and stockholders to know that, although the prices for the crop of 1923 were very low, there was an increase of \$227.67 in the total amount of business done over that of the year before.

For the coming year the directors are working out a plan for distributing the surplus to the customers of the store according to the amount of their purchases during the year.

At the end of the year when the inventory is made a dividend will be declared on the stock, five per cent of the remaining profit will be placed in the general fund according to law, and the balance of the earnings will be distributed to the customers upon the return of their tickets before February 1, 1925.

New Health Rate Announcement By far the most important step taken for the last five years in safeguarding the health of the children of Hood River county was taken last month by the county health officer when he issued the following order to both city and county superintendents, namely: "No child is to be admitted to any school in the county from any school outside the county without presenting a certificate signed by a licensed physician or the county nurse, stating that upon examination the said child was found to be free from all signs of contagious or infectious diseases."

This order marks a long stride towards the goal of the educational committee of the Health association—the goal of all schools fit and safe for well children with the sick and ailing kept at home under medical supervision. With a little cooperation of the teachers, Parent-Teacher association and community health groups in arranging for examinations at the school or in town, at times to suit the health authorities, the harvest season troubles may be eliminated.

Transient help is a permanent economic necessity in Hood River and the children of the help are a problem for the schools. The epidemic of this past winter showed flaws in the local health program. In some instances parents were to blame, in others, those in authority. Only by the closest harmony, intelligence and cooperation of all concerned can Hood River hope to escape the annual affliction of some disease among the children.
