Fifty boxes of Pacific coast Spitz-enburgs recently sold in La Paz, Bolivia, for about \$12 per box, realizing up to 33 cents per fruit, according to D. C. McDonough, American consul at La Paz. The lot was sold out in one day, resulting in additional quantities being ordered for immediate shipment. American apples have been selling in Chile for \$7 per box, 120s. As supplies in La Paz increase, the price will undoubtedly decline to more reasonable levels.
