OUTLOOK GOOD FOR FINE CROP AT LYLE

H. W. Daggatt and W. J. Havener, Lyle, Wash., fruit growers and shippers, here last week, reported that prospects are fine for a bumper yield in that section this season.

"The orchards," said Mr. Daggatt, "are in better condition by far than at this time a year ago. From present indications, our bloom will not occur until well in May. The cold weather of December apparently has caused us no damage. The earth is filled with moisture.

"Last year, because of the drought that lasted throughout the early spring and summer, our tonnage was cut materially. We shipped only about 75 carloads of fruit from Lyle. This season we place our estimate at 100 cars."

Jury Finds Gibson Not Guilty

After 20 minutes of deliberation a jury in the case of the State versus Randolph Gibson, of The Dalles, charged with complicity in operation of an Upper Valley moonshine still, last Friday returned a verdict of not guilty. Because of Gibson's former prominence as a merchant in The Dalles, the case created considerable interest.

Gibson was indicted by a grand jury week before last, following the sentencing of Jack Crawford, former laborer of The Dalles, to a year in the penitentiary on a liquor charge. Crawford pleaded guilty but declared in a written statement to the court that he had been influenced by Gibson, who owed him money for cutting wood on a place owned by the latter in the Upper Valley, to accept pay in moonshine materials, and that the two were accomplices in the setting up and operation of the still. He was retained here as the chief witness against Gibson. As corroborative testimony, the state produced witnesses to show that Gibson had purchased the tin wash boiler, from which a part of the still was made, from E. M. Strauss, a merchant at Mosier. It was further proven by T. Balsler, clerk at a Parkdale store, that Gibson had purchased 12 glass fruit jars there in January. Gibson admitted both purchases, but stated that he had bought the articles at the instance of Crawford.

The defense built up the theory that Crawford was seeking revenge for the failure of Gibson to come here and testify in his behalf at his preliminary hearing.

Haskin Has Tame Fox

Dale M. Haskin, who operates fox farms here and at Newberg, lays claim to the tamest pair of foxes in the United States. They are "Buster" and "Timmy," two silver blacks, aged about nine months. The foxes accompany Mr. Haskin on automobile tours, and one day last week he brought "Timmy" to the city, leading her on a leash like a dog. The day before he had traveled here from Newberg, and the little female fox had slept the most of the way, he said, cuddled up beside him on the front seat.
