PORTLANDER DIES IN LEAP FROM BRIDGE

The body of William Traub, aged 64, veteran carman of the Portland Electric Power Co., who jumped from the interstate bridge, just north of the channel span Friday afternoon, was seen floating some 300 feet below the bridge about noon Sunday by Mrs. M. Mosher, who lives near the river's edge. She telephoned to Harry Conaway, and the latter dispatched Ed Wright to the scene in a motor boat.

The body was brought here Sunday night and taken to Portland immediately by C. G. Anderson.

John Jones, of White Salmon, found Mr. Traub's outer garments on the bridge Friday afternoon. Shortly afterward he saw a man jump from the Washington approach to the bridge and disappear into the brush. This led to the belief that Mr. Traub had faked suicide. A posse, composed of Portland Woodmen of the World and power company workers, joined Killek, that county authorities in conducting a vain search. The sight of the man also led to the theory of murder, but the man's body indicated no signs of foul play.

Mr. Traub is survived by his wife, two daughters and a son. He had been in ill health and melancholy for some time.

Carnine Finds Prospects Good

Sidney B. Carnine, son of Mrs. S. B. Carnine, of the West Side, and member of the headquarters office of Kogobel & Day in New York city, was here Monday while on a tour of Northwestern boxes in apple sections. Mr. Carnine, who has been in Yakima and Wenatchee, said prospects there indicate a large tonnage of fruit this season.

"I find that orchards are advanced in Washington sections about as far as in Hood River," Mr. Carnine stated. "The time of the bloom depends largely on the weather of April. Continued warm weather would bring a hasty development of buds. Growers would prefer continued cool weather for several weeks. I find growers in all sections paying particular attention to spraying problems this season."

Signboards to be Swatted

In order to prevent a signboard nuisance on privately owned property, the State Highway Commission has started condemnation proceedings and will acquire sections of land in loops of the Columbia River highway just east of here. Most of the land within the picturesque loops was secured several years ago, and plans call for its beautification. A section, however, was not acquired, and recently, according to J. R. Nickelsen, it had begun to sprout a crop of signs.

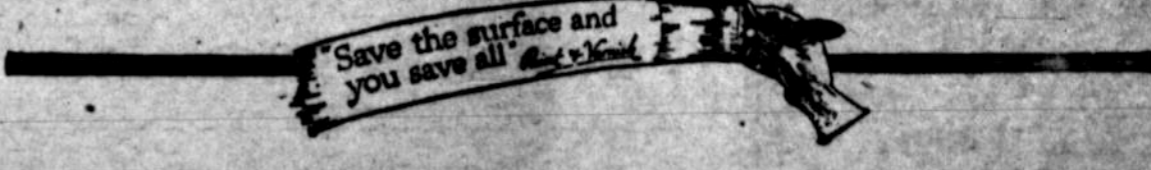
