THE VIGILANTES OF OLD HOOD RIVER

(By Capt. H. C. Coe)

"What a vigilante gang in Hood River! Give it to us!"

But it is a goodly truth, and let me
say that I have been the guilty party. I
would rather a dozen times over have
faced the entire aggregation of judges
and juries of the Pacific coast than
that gang of staid, sober, orderly,
law-abiding farmers. And let me tell
you that there are some of that iden-
tical gang of vigilantes still lying in
Hood River as you will learn before
this story is told.

When I first laid out the town I
inserted a whiskey clause in every
deed, as I did not intend to have
saloons in my home town, although
many claimed that the clause was
void. Yet it was in the deed. But a
man whom I will call "John
Roberts," in conjunction with the

ing that it would be free of saloons,
and the proposition that we must
have a saloon to tempt our children
with liquor is just plain robbery."

"Consequently it is not to be thought of
for a moment, and we are here to put
the saloon out of business tonight.
Are you with us or not?"

"Heart and hand," I replied. "What
is the program?"

"The liquor are to be emptied and
the containers destroyed and then the
building will be wrecked," he said.

At that point the door opened and
the guard said Mr. Coe and Mr. Fra-
sier were wanted outside. On going
out we were met by a committee from
the saloon with the word that if we
would go home and not do anything
that night the saloon would be closed
for good and the liquors shipped back
to The Dalles and not returned again.
Then we all went home well satisfied
with the night's work. No, there were
no masks nor whips—just a bunch
did not need any—and John Roberts
kept his word.

follows:
Spitzenburg, 125s and larger 37 per
cent, 135 to 125s 41 per cent, 175s to
200s 16, and 225s and smaller 6 per
cent; Newtown, 125s and larger 29
per cent, 135-160s 35 per cent, 175-
200s 21, and 215 and smaller 15; Or-
tley, 125s and larger 50 per cent, 135-
160s 34, 175-200s 12, 215 and smaller
15; Arkansas, 125s and larger 40
per cent, 135-160s 40, 175-200s 15,
and 215 and smaller 5; Jonathans, 135
and larger 17, 135-160s 40, 175-200s 31,
and 215 and smaller 12; Delicious, 125
and larger 39, 135-160s 38, 175-200s 18,
and 215 and smaller 5.

BILLY SUNDAY TO COME TO PORTLAND

Rev. William A. Sunday, over whom
Portland ministers have debated for
months in an attempt to determine
whether he should be brought to that
city to conduct a series of evangel-
istic meetings, is going. He will be
there September 6 to October 25. Mr.
Sunday's last word several weeks ago
that he could not accept the invita-
tion, proffered by a large group of
Portland churches, owing to the fact
that while they were arguing he had
given the date to another place.

Mr. Sunday's reason for deciding
against the Portland invitation in the
