## FINS, FURS AND FEATHERS

An old Scottish gentleman, who was a great fishing enthusiast and a young man who was equally enthusiastic about angling, had spent the entire day along one of their favorite streams and had had remarkable fishing. As they left for home, the old man remarked, while his rugged face glowed in the sun, "I have had a grand day, but it's been a grand day!"

"It has," assented the young man. "Think we could come again on the morrow, laddie?"

"Well," answered the young man reflectively, "I was to be married, but I can put it off." — Oregon Sportsman.

"There is a rumor floating around," says J. H. Fredrick, "that the streams of the Upper Valley are closed to fishing indefinitely. This is absolutely erroneous. The law reads: 'The West Fork at its junction with the East Fork; the East Fork at its junction with the Middle Fork; the Middle Fork at its junction with the South Fork; and all tributaries thereto are closed to fishing until June 1st of each year.'"

"All streams south of the junction of the West Fork and East Fork are open to fishing from June 1st until November 30th of each year. The main river north of the junction of the East Fork and West Fork is open to fishing as follows: For migratory fish, (salmon, trout, steelhead, chinook and silver salmon) 15 inches and over in length the entire year, and for trout, (rainbow, cutthroat, eastern brook, Dolly Varden, reddsides and native trout) from April 15th to November 30th of each year."

Local fishermen are now journeying to the White Salmon river to inspect a fish elevator that has been constructed over the dam of the Northwestern Electric Co. The elevator works in two sections. The first lifts the fish, which assemble in a pool at the foot of the dam to a second pool 75 feet high. Here they are released and are caught by another which carries them another 75 feet to the lake above the dam. Steelhead are now gathering below the dam, on their annual pilgrimage up to the headwaters to spawn.

Prof. Cobb, dean of the department of fisheries at the University of Washington, is on the ground with a crew of five assistants, watching the experiment.

Mill and Buck creeks, above the big power company's dam, have been closed until 1924. They will be allowed to remain open to permit the migratory fish to spawn.

## News of the Golfers

Due to the fact that the Portland Rotarians will be here Saturday and Sunday, the qualifying rounds of the Hood River Country Club course between 9 and 11 o'clock Sunday forenoon, the contemplated local Country versus City team matches will be postponed to a later date.

Those who desire can plan to get in their qualifying rounds for the all-season golf tournament that day in the afternoon, but the tournament committee has extended the time of qualifying for this tournament to include Sunday, April 12, because of the congestion expected on the course Sunday.

A description in full of the golf tournament and its object and special rules for its matches has been posted at the club bulletin board, and members are requested to scan this carefully, as it is too long to print in the local papers. In brief, the tournament is to be a qualifying round as a basis for starting the individual challenge matches for the winning of each other's goats. These "goats" will be medals struck off and given to the winner. Every player has the right to challenge any player in the list above him, and upon beating him, wins that person's goat and exchanges positions with him.

The men will play in one section and the women in a separate section. At the end of play, September 1, a dinner will be given the whole entry list by the golfers' players at that time. In addition, a prize will be given in each section of 20 men or 10 women, so that all players in the club have equal chance, whatever their relative golfing ability. As the qualifying rounds in this tournament will be used as a basis of team selection for both men's and women's teams for the spring season, it is hoped that every club member will help make it a success by taking part.

At the suggestion of Leroy Childs, who is an ardent golfer, the tractor used on the Oak Grove Links of the Hood River Country Club is being equipped with a wide, flat-surfaced wheel, both rear and front. ## SPRAY RECOMMENDATIONS ARE GIVEN

(By Leroy Childs)

It is rather difficult to outline a spray and at the same time economical spray program. Owing to the complete lack of apple aphid, it appears that we can omit some of the sprays used to handle this disease this year.

For this reason, a delayed dormant spray has not been generally recommended. However, there are some orchardists who have experienced much trouble with the brown aphid and where this is the case, control measures should be employed. Brown aphid is best controlled just as the first leaves are breaking through the buds and some time in advance of the pink stage. Where this spray is thought advisable, 6-6-50 Bordeaux and 5 to 6 per cent oil (3 ft. weather is warm, 4 ft. cold and cloudy) should be applied. Growers must recognize the fact that Bordeaux cannot be used after the blossom buds become exposed, as rusting of the fruit will occur. For this reason, this spray must be applied at once if it is to be employed.

Growers not desiring to use the Bordeaux combination can use lime sulphur 1-35 plus Black Leaf at the rate of 1½ pints to 200 gallons. Both of these sprays will assist in controlling mildew.

Where mildew is serious, a definite schedule should be employed throughout the season. This would involve the applying of the delayed dormant, which is now due, the pink and calyx applications. The station would recommend the 6-6-50 Bordeaux for the first application, followed by lime sulphur in the pink and calyx at the rate of 1-35.

Where rusting has been observed on pears and the fruit worm is present, atomic sulphur or the dry-mix sulphur should be used in the pink stage. Along with double strength arsenate of lead. These sprays should be used at the rate of 12 pounds to the 100 of atomic or 8 pounds of the dry-mix sulphur, together with four pounds — 100 arsenate of lead.

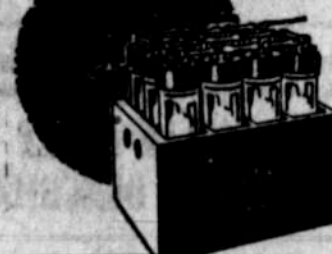
