**PEAR YIELD HEAVIER
APPLE BLOOM LIGHT**

While the yield of pears here the coming season according to present indications, will be more than 100 per cent greater than last year, when an approximate 150 cars were shipped, the apple tonnage will be much lighter for 1925 than for 1924. Indications point to a somewhat spotted bloom of apples. The cherry tonnage of this year will be heavier than last season, but peaches will be negligible here the coming summer and fall.

Both S. G. Osborn and Robert Tawell, who own the district's only commercial peach tracts, report that the bloom, as a result of the below-zero temperatures of last December, will be very light.

Because of the light apple yield in many orchards, Leroy Childs has urged growers against carelessness in application of arsenate of lead sprays for control of codling moth the coming season.

"The moths are always worse," said Mr. Childs, "when the apples are thin on the trees, and growers are prone to pass over many trees, thinking it is not worth while to spray them because of lack of apples and discover
